

Six Nominated For Directors Of Community Chest

Six persons have been nominated to fill vacancies on the board of directors of the Roseburg Community Chest. It was announced by David J. McCarroll, secretary. Persons who have contributed to the chest will be given an opportunity to vote on the nominations by using the ballots printed in the News-Review today.

The nominees were picked by four Roseburg service clubs—Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions, and Active—and two labor organizations—Roseburg Central Labor Council, AFL, and the International Woodworkers of America, CIO—McCarroll explained. If elected, the nominees will serve as individuals and not as representatives of their respective organizations.

Four of the new directors will be picked to serve regular terms of three years each, while two will be chosen to fill vacancies created by members of the board leaving the city. McCarroll said these selections will be made by a drawing after the election.

Nominees whose names appear on the ballot are Roy Catehling, J. V. Long, Elton Clark, Wilson Henson, Frank Ashlev, and Eugene Miller. Additional nominations may be written in, if desired, McCarroll said. The ballots will be published today, Tuesday and Wednesday. Any person who has contributed to the Community Chest is considered a member. Ballots may be mailed to McCarroll, care of Stearns, Flynn & Co., Pacific Bldg.

Portland Machinists' Vote Favors Strike

PORTLAND, March 29.—(AP)—Independent machinists here have voted to strike as negotiations for a new contract near the expiration date of the old agreement.

H. J. Detloff, secretary of the union local, said the 3,000 members involved have asked a 25-cent an hour increase over the present \$1.60 an hour rate for journeymen. The present contract expires April 1.

Detloff said the employers have offered an 8-cent-an-hour increase.

Stay of Injunction Refused Typo Union

HAMMOND, Ind., March 29.—(AP)—The International Typographical union today was denied a stay of an injunction restraining it from causing printers' strikes that violate the Taft-Hartley law.

Union counsel had asked Federal Judge Luther M. Swygert to stay his injunction order of Saturday pending an appeal. The injunction was granted to the government as a result of a strike of ITU printers on Chicago newspapers and in other cities.

"The court has found the prob-

able existence of certain unfair labor practices and they have an effect on the public interest," Judge Swygert said in denying the stay.

"The decision restrained them (unfair labor practices) and to grant a stay would nullify the very purpose of the injunction."

Pursued Fishing Boat Upsets; One Man Drowns

ST. HELENS, Ore., March 29.—(AP)—One man drowned and another was injured over the weekend when a fishing boat capsized in the Columbia river here.

The victim, Leland Burchum, 24, St. Helens, failed to come to

the surface after the craft heeled over in the water. A Coast Guard patrol crew pulled George Domeyer, 21, Scappoose, to safety. He clung to the capsized boat.

Lt. William Yoemans of the Portland Harbor Patrol reported the fishing boat had attempted to pass between the sternwheel tug Portland and a tanker under tow traveling upriver. The Coast

Guard was in pursuit of the fishing boat at the time, Lt. Yoemans reported.
