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Aid Program Bid Slated for Spain

House Votes Against Wish Of State Dept.

Offer to Franco Regime
Meets Sharp Criticism,
Causes Surprise Abroad

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—The House voted 149 to 52 today to invite Franco Spain into the \$6,205,000,000 foreign aid program.

The foreign affairs committee had agreed to include Spain. But Rep. Vorys, in charge of the aid bill, said the State Department is against it.

And whether the Senate will go along is another question. In any event, Spain could get in on the program only if she agreed like other participating countries to join in a European recovery program of cooperation and self help.

Spain now is specifically named as eligible to qualify under the bill before the House. Eastern European nations are not.

The door is open for Russia and her satellite nations to come in under the same terms as Spain, by agreeing to terms of the program.

Additional of Spain would require some research into Spanish needs and requirements. And that in turn could result either in increasing the total size of the European program or spreading the money among 17 instead of 16 countries.

Opposition Voiced
Rep. Javits opposed inclusion of Spain. He told the House it was "making a very grave mistake." He said the United States does

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M'Arthur's Strike Ban
Only Partly Effective
TOKYO, March 30.—(AP)—The Japanese Communications Workers' Union called off its threatened general strike of 400,000 members today.

An estimated 200,000 already had walked out, however, in regional walkouts.

General MacArthur yesterday banned the general strike. Chief Union Secretary Nagaoka said he did not believe the directive applied to regional walkouts.

Union President Dobashi announced regional work stoppages would be continued in most of Japan's vital areas. A new union order calls for 48-hour layoffs beginning tomorrow in Hokkaido and in northern Honshu.

Tokyo is expected — "it's too close to General MacArthur," a union spokesman said. The union is seeking higher pay.

Fines, Jail Terms Meted
Four Drunken Drivers
Four persons have recently been sentenced in Justice Court to 30 days each in the county jail and fined \$100 apiece on charges of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. Justice of the Peace Hartfield reported today.

He said they included: Opal Alice Weir, 33, of Yoncalla, who also was fined \$10 for driving a vehicle without an operator's license; Roland Reed, 25, Fall City, Ore.; Acey Charles Weeks, Roseburg, and Lynn T. McNabb, Roseburg.

A license of each violator was revoked for one year, Hartfield also reported.

Roseburg Stop Dated In
Tourist Promotion Tour
Roseburg will be a stop for the Oregon Advertising Club's "Tour of Oregon," arranged by the organization's tourist promotion committee, April 13.

The tour, which includes several Western Oregon cities, will aid a campaign during the week of April 11 to 17, reminding Oregonians to "be good hosts" during the forthcoming tourist season.

Speakers from various parts of the state will be included in the party, along with special entertainment from Portland radio stations. Del Milne, Multnomah Hotel, is in charge of the tour for the club.

Arson Alleged In
House Trailer Fire
Charged with burning down a trailer with the intent of collecting insurance, Fred Gordon Cosby, Roseburg, has been bound over to the grand jury with bail set at \$1,000. Justice of the Peace Hartfield reported.

Cosby allegedly set fire to his house trailer Feb. 15, at its location at 1642 N. Stephens St., to collect \$400 insurance on the trailer and \$1,000 on household goods, Hartfield said. Cosby waived a preliminary hearing. He was committed to the county jail.

President Truman Suggests That Wallace Take His Third Party Movement to Russia

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—Henry A. Wallace came back to the capital today, hard on the heels of President Truman's thinly veiled suggestion that he take his whole third party movement to Russia.

At the same time anti-Truman Democrats refused to accept as final an official Army declaration that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is no more available to them than

And on the other side of the political fence, reports bobbed up that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey and Senator Robert A. Taft have agreed to gang up against Harold E. Stassen's bid for Maine's 13 GOP convention votes.

These were the developments, one at a time.

Mr. Truman, who less than two weeks ago denounced "Henry Wallace and his Communists," in a St. Patrick's day speech, took another poke at his ousted cabinet officer and presidential rival. The setting this time was a dinner meeting of Greek-Americans, the Order of Ahepa.

The President was introduced by Dean Alfange of New York, who told the audience that Wallace and his followers ought to go to the Rocky Mountains "in the role of the Greek guerrillas."

Then Alfange continued, Premier Stalin might recognize the former vice president as "the leader of the free government of the United States."

Truman Adds "Advice"
"The dean has stolen my thunder," Mr. Truman said in his extemporaneous remarks. "I was going to tell you that the Greeks had a Henry Wallace. * * * They had the greatest demagogue of all times, Alcibiades."

But, the chief executive continued, "if imitators of that ancient Greek conqueror want to see * * * liberties subverted, I suggest that they go not to the Rocky Mountains—that's fine country out there. He ought to go to the country he loves so well and help them against his own country if that's the way he feels."

There was no immediate rejoinder from Wallace. He repeatedly has accused the President of adopting policies that will lead

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Fadling's Recall As
IWA Member Sought
VANCOUVER, B. C., March 30.—(AP)—Petitions asking the recall of President James E. Fadling of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) soon will be presented to Carl Winn, union secretary, according to Harold Pritchett, vice-president of the British Columbia district.

The provincial official said yesterday the petitions have been signed by more than the required five per cent of British Columbia members. Other petitions are being circulated in the Washington district.

The recall move was started at the union's January convention after Fadling dismissed several organizers for failure to sign affidavits required by the Taft-Hartley act.

The ad was placed after many persons had come to see the infant, members of the family said, adding that everyone left a little something for the baby.

Railroads O. K. Pay Increase; Unions Delay

CHICAGO, March 30.—(AP)—The nation's railroads are ready to grant a wage increase of 2 1/2 cents an hour to 253,000 engineers, firemen and switchmen, as recommended by President Truman's fact-finding board.

But the rail brotherhoods representing the workers haven't decided whether they will accept the pay hike. "The unions, who asked for a 30 per cent wage boost, expressed disappointment over the board's findings."

The general chairman of the unions will meet in Cleveland next Monday to act on the board's recommendations—which are not mandatory.

If they reject the pay boost the government is expected to seek further discussions. But there will be no strike immediately. Under the Railway Labor Act the unions are required to continue at work for a 30-day period ending April

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Prowling Subs Not Hers, Russia Says

LONDON, March 30.—(AP)—The official Soviet news agency Tass last night denied that unidentified submarines sighted off the coast of the United States were Russian.

Tass described reports that the submarines were Russian as an "absurd and grossly slanderous invention, calculated to deceive American public opinion."

"The noted that Navy Secretary John L. Sullivan told a Senate Committee last Wednesday that submarines had been sighted which did not belong 'to any nation west of the Iron Curtain.'"

The news agency said Sullivan "gave it to be understood that these submarines were Russian ones."

It added that Sullivan's statement was taken up by "several American newspapers which are disseminating sensational rumors to the effect that Russian submarines were sighted near the U. S. Coast."

(Sullivan did not name any nation in his testimony before the Senate Armed Services Committee. Russia, however, is the only nation behind the Iron Curtain known to have a submarine fleet.)

Curb Exchange Strike
In N.Y. Marked by Riot
NEW YORK, March 30.—(AP)—Violence broke out in the new Stock and Curb Exchange strikes today as waves of pickets rushed police at the entrance to the New York Stock Exchange.

Men were knocked down, women screamed, some police were thrown to the sidewalk. One detective was picked up, his head bleeding.

Uniformed police swung clubs and calls were sent for ambulances, police emergency squads and patrol wagons.

The skirmish began as the pickets lined up before the exchanges on the second day of the strike in the heart of the world financial center.

Within six minutes the disturbance was ended.

Students Find More
Than \$2,000 in City Dump
COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, March 30.—(AP)—Because three college students went to the city dump for material to make a skirt, they were splitting up more than \$2,000 today.

Police Chief Arnold Engen said the boys found the money in a rusty metal box. They turned it over to police but a two-week search failed to disclose the owner. An F.B.I. check assured that the cash was not loot from any robbery.

The students, all in their second year at North Idaho Junior College are Malcolm Stahl of Dayton, Ohio; Dewey Sells of Sandpoint, and David Klehm of Coeur D'Alene. They said they would use the money to continue in school.

Truman Asks Observance
Of "I Am American Day"
WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—President Truman today asked for wide-spread observance of Sunday, May 16, as "I Am An American Day."

He said in a proclamation that foreign and domestic problems facing the nation "require unselfish devotion and united effort on the part of all our citizens."

"Loyalty to a great ideal has brought together people of every race, creed, and culture—all blended into a unity which has been the strength of our country and has enabled it to meet every crisis," he added.

Leniency For Miners' Chief Reaches End

Failure to Comply Will
Again Expose Lewis To
Charge of Contempt

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—John L. Lewis today bowed to a federal court order and appeared before a presidential board inquiring into the soft coal strike.

Lewis, flanked by more than 20 aides, walked into the board's chamber at approximately ten minutes before the meeting was to begin at 11 A. M. (PST).

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—Justice Edward M. Curran ordered John L. Lewis to appear today before President Truman's board of inquiry in the coal strike at 11 a. m. PST.

Curran acted quickly after Lewis' attorney raised the question of adequate time to reply to the summons and challenged the constitutionality of the Taft-Hartley act.

Wesley K. Hopkins, attorney for the chief of the United Mine Workers, had argued barely 10 minutes when Curran ruled. Lewis did not appear personally to explain why he should not appear before the board of inquiry.

Curran told Hopkins the court had been lenient in granting Lewis an opportunity to "show cause." The judge said that in his opinion he could have directed Lewis to appear before the board without the formality of today's hearing.

The order for Lewis to appear before the board today, Curran said, would have to be served on Lewis personally.

Officers Face Problem
This posed a new problem for U. S. Marshals. They had a merry chase yesterday in trying to reach Lewis with the subpoena from the inquiry board, and later the court order to show cause.

Lewis sent four lawyers to Curran's court—Hopkins, Earl Houck, Harrison W. Combs and T. C. Townsend.

In the case of the court order, Lewis must obey or lay himself open to a charge of contempt of court. A contempt finding could wind up with the United Mine Workers' chief getting a jail

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Nevada Divorce Voided in Oregon

SALEM, March 30.—(AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court today ruled a Nevada divorce invalid, and paved the way for making invalid hundreds of similar Nevada divorces obtained by Oregon citizens.

"The decision means that most Nevada divorces aren't worth the paper they are written on as far as Oregon is concerned," a high court official said.

The Supreme Court's unanimous decision was the first dealing with the subject of Nevada's divorce law which requires only six weeks' residence to get a divorce.

The court ruled that an Oregon citizen can't go to Nevada just to get a divorce. Oregon won't recognize the divorce unless he actually changes his residence to Nevada.

The decision was given in the Multnomah County case of Mrs. Anna Kelley against Emery B. Kelley, who went to Nevada Jan. 16, 1945, and got his divorce decree three months later. He returned to Oregon immediately.

Mrs. Kelley then brought suit to dissolve the Nevada divorce decree, and she asked for a separation plus \$10 a month support money.

The lower court of Judge David R. Vandenberg, Klamath Falls, held the Nevada divorce illegal because Kelley hadn't actually changed his legal residence to Nevada. He just went there for the sole purpose of getting a divorce. Mrs. Kelley also won her separation and the support money.

The high court decision, by Chief Justice George Rossman, upheld the lower court.

Item for Bonneville
Under Truman's Request
WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—The House Appropriations committee approved today \$825,000 for operation and maintenance of the Bonneville power administration transmission system.

The amount is \$100,000 less than recommended by President Truman's budget. The committee said the \$825,000 will enable the agency to employ more people for the remainder of the fiscal year ending June 30.

The committee also approved additional contract authorization of \$1,475,000, the amount requested by the budget, to provide additional transmission lines.

Reign of Violence Continues In Italy as Regime Strives To Beat Reds in Coming Election

ROME, March 30.—(AP)—Italian party leaders, disturbed by two political killings in the leftist north yesterday, arranged to meet tomorrow to seek remedies for a rash of violence which threatens their campaign truce.

Communist Umberto Terracini, president of the constituent assembly, who arranged the truce in an effort to bar bloodshed in the campaign for the vital April 18 elections, called the meeting.

Stave-swinging unemployed, some 7,000 strong, marched through the streets of Milan today, demanding work and relief payments. Police stood by anxiously, because of yesterday's widespread outbursts, but there were no incidents of violence.

The situation was tense as a result of the slaying of two Communists yesterday at Samoggia, 25 miles west of Milan, the leftist stronghold of the north. Campaigners were mauled, beaten, pelted with overripe fruit and thrown from platforms at other points in the north.

There was street fighting in Bari, in the south, and one man was stabbed. Both leftists and rightists were targets of the violence in the north.

The Italian news agency Ansa reported from Pantelleria that three persons were killed and some others wounded there by police fire when a crowd, protesting taxation measures, set fire to a government building. Pantelleria is a small island off the Sicilian coast.
