INVITATION TO MURDER

We appear to be on the mailing list of the National Council for Prevention of War as we receive occasional copies of that organization's publication, Peace Action.

Sounds fine, doesn't it? We wonder how healthy, educated, free and contented are the people of Czechoslovakia, Korea, Manchuria and other countries where Soviet Russia has imposed political controls by communistic minorities upon helpless majorities.

But listen to Peace Action: Our militarists have now become warmongers again, as they have done on occasion in the past when they wanted exorbitant military appropriations.

Keep cool! And let your Congressman and Senators know that you understand the scare. Write them! Tell them that the "Truman Doctrine" was another blunder and its failure should now lead to a sincere drive for world disarmament and not to expanding its scope.

There is more of the same, but that's a sufficient sample of the ideas the National Council for Prevention of War is trying to instill into the public mind.

Disarmament! Is it difficult to recall what happened when we tried that scheme once before? We scrapped our battleships while Japan built up a naval force which gave us plenty of trouble in the early days of the war.

Is war imminent? Not if we are prepared to fight. But isn't Communism overrunning weak nations as rapidly as is humanly possible? War WOULD be imminent if we, too, became weak.

Cut defense appropriations? Fire our experienced military men? Wouldn't that be just dandy? Russia's rapidly expanding military forces could ask nothing better.

Put our money into education, houses and soil conservation? That's a grand idea. We're for it. But we also want our schools, our homes and our soil protected.

It is easy to prey upon the sentiments of the proverbial peace-loving American citizen. We want no wars. We dislike militarism. We have no imperialistic policies.

We have always had the deepest sympathy for the true and honest pacifist, even though we believed his doctrine and teachings to border on the criminal side.

Appeals such as those found in Peace Action find fertile fields in the minds of sentimentalists, but acceptance of the plan as outlined could easily result in the loss of freedom and the virtual murder of hundreds of thousands of our finest men.

It is nice to be idealistic, but it is foolish to stick our heads in the sand to avoid realization of the danger which surrounds us.

New Contracts To End Strikes Of Printers Loom

HAMMOND, Ind., March 30.—(AP)—Early renewal of contract negotiations designed to settle strikes of AFL printers against several of the nation's newspapers appeared certain today.

The AFL International Typographical Union said new contracts are to be offered publishers of the struck newspapers, by all striking local unions and will comply with a federal court order.

There was no immediate comment from publishers of the struck newspapers on the ITU's announcement of its plan to end the current work stoppages. Strikes are in progress in at least eight cities.

The conference was held after Judge Swygert had refused to stay enforcement of an injunction issued yesterday forbidding the ITU from causing printers' strikes that violate the Taft-Hartley law.

The injunction will be in effect until the NLRB rules on the government's charges that the union violated the Taft-Hartley act.

Counties Lacking In Facilities For Mental Patients

PORTLAND, Ore.—(AP)—The Oregon Mental Hygiene Society reports that no Oregon county, with the possible exception of Multnomah, has suitable quarters for mental patients awaiting hearings or commitment.

At present, the society said, no hospitals outside Portland are equipped to handle mental cases. Consequently it is difficult to detain such persons anywhere but in jail.

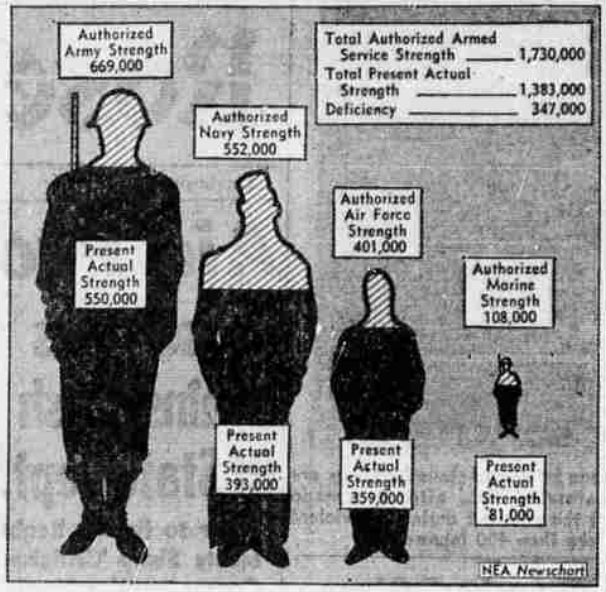
Baker County Far Exceeds Savings Bonds Sale Quota

Thrips are generally found about the same time in all prune growing sections of the county and growers are advised by Parker to return the count before damage is done to the buds.
