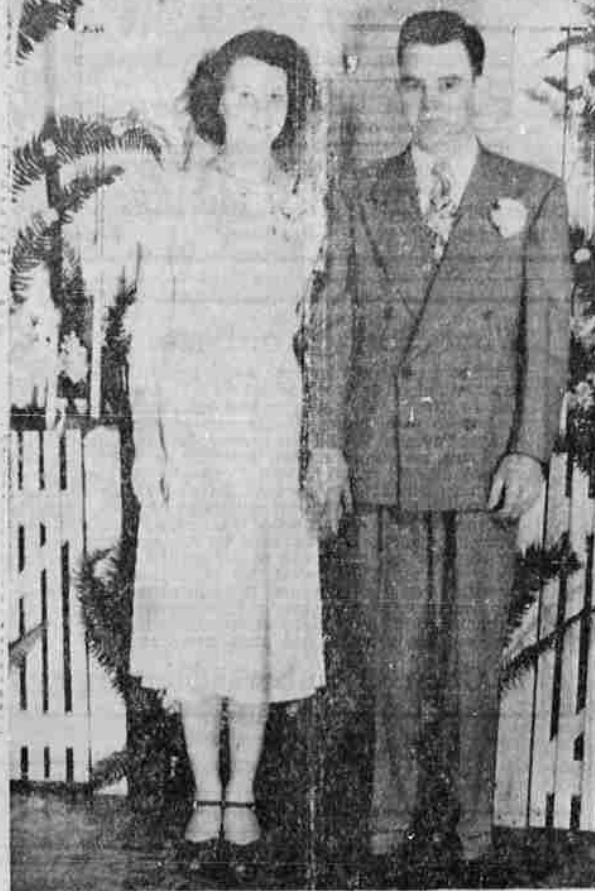

Pile batter into an ungreased tube pan, 10 inches in diameter, and bake in a preheated slow oven, 325°, for 1 hour 20-25 minutes, or until top of cake springs back when lightly pressed. Remove from oven and invert pan on cake rack until thoroughly cold. Remove cake from pan and spread sides and top of cake with Bittersweet Icing. 12 servings.

 Measure into a small saucepan —
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/2 cup cream

Bring just to the boiling point and pour hot mixture over —
