

Forest Nursery Grows Trees For Oregon Farmers

SALEM, April 1.—(AP)—Oregon State College's extension forester Charles Ross is trying to get every Oregon farmer to have a little forest of his own.

The Oregon forest nursery, run by the State Forestry Department, grows 500,000 trees a year just for farmers. The farmers can buy them at low cost. Tree orders from farmers now are heavier than ever.

Ross says every Oregon farm could use a few trees, either in a woodlot, in a shelter belt, or to improve the scenery.

Most of the trees so far have gone to the irrigated sections of Central and Eastern Oregon. But ranchers in the dry land areas are hard to convince when it comes to putting in trees. Ross said trees in Eastern Oregon serve as windbreaks, shelter belts, or for shade.

Extensive tree plantings have been made on farms in the Columbia river and coast counties. There they are used to protect homes, crops and livestock from strong winds.

Ross said tree planting for fence posts, cascara and Christmas trees will be a big money maker for farmers in the near future.

Hay Crop To Be Short

Livestock owners, especially those in the Willamette Valley, have cause to work up a mild case of hay fever because of the poor hay outlook.

E. R. Jackman, crops specialist of the OSC extension service, says Western Oregon vetch hay—which normally produces the bulk of Western Oregon's hay—will be extremely short this year. Wet weather has cut the vetch acreage to the lowest point in many years.

Alfalfa and clover acreage is way down too. Jackman urges stockmen to buy their hay early.

Oregon's acreage this year of spring planted field crops will be five per cent more than last year. Barley acreage is up 21 per cent, spring wheat and corn up 18 per cent, and oats up one per cent.

Farmers will grow more flaxseed, but less dry peas, beans and sugar beets.

Farm Brevities
Pacific coast farm wage rates are four times what they were 10 years ago. They are higher than the national average.

Don't strain out your lawn. Moss is caused by a shortage of nitrogen. So put some good nitrate fertilizer on your lawn and watch the moss go away.

The insecticide, benzene hexachloride, is great stuff for killing wire worms and other insects. But Robert Every, an OSC bug and insect specialist, urges farmers not to use it.

The reason: It gives a bad flavor to potatoes, carrots, and possibly some other crops. And not only that, the bad flavor might last for a year or more after the farmer quits using it.

And it also gives a bad flavor to poultry meat, making it impossible to eat.

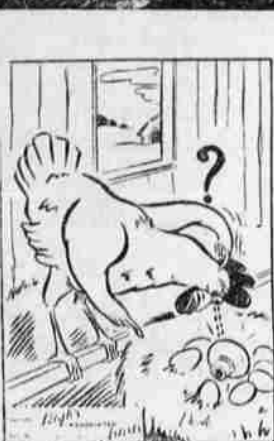

His leadership and devotion to duty throughout were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Lieutenant Esselstrom is authorized to wear the Combat "V".

1 cup Pot Milk
1 cup water
1/2 cup corn meal
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped, pared apples

3/4 lb. link pork sausage
2 1/2 tablespoons cold water

Turn on oven; set at hot (425° F.). Heat milk and water to boiling. Stir in corn meal and salt so slowly that boiling does not stop. Add apples. Boil and stir 5 min. Pour into greased 8-in. baking dish. Put sausage and cold water into skillet. Cover; steam 5 min. Arrange sausages on top of corn meal mixture. Bake 15 min., or until sausages are brown. Serve with fried apple slices, if desired. Makes 4 servings.
