Wilson, of Seattle, Sunday, March 21, at the First Presbyterian Church in Roseburg. Dr. Morris H. Roach performed the nuptials at three-thirty o'clock in the presence of 250 relatives and friends.

Mrs. Homer Grow, organist, played softly as the altar candles were lighted by Miss Pamela Pearce of Seattle, cousin of the bride. Miss Pearce wore a gown of white dotted Swiss. Mrs. Thomas Garrison Roseburg, aunt of the bride, sang, "O Perfect Love" and at the close of the ceremony, sang the benediction. The traditional wedding marches were played by Mrs. Grow.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was very beautiful in a floor-length gown of white lace over white satin, fashioned with a full train, long sleeves and Princess bodice with a sweetheart neckline. Her finger-tip veil of illusion was held in place by a coronet of seedpearls. She carried a sheaf of calla lilies.
