Socialite's Death Said Due to Sleeping Tablets—SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—(P)—Mrs. Weymouth Simpson Coleman, 31-year-old socialite, was found dead in her bed in the Coleman's Pacific Heights apartment yesterday.

Deputy Coroner Paul Green said preliminary investigation indicated death from an overdose of sleeping tablets. She was found by her husband of two years, wealthy James V. Coleman, Jr., 38. He told police they had a minor spat Wednesday.

Coleman at 13 was named chief beneficiary of his father's \$10,000,000 estate, including valuable mining property in Calaveras county.

Church Doctrines Reaffirmed As Basis for Unity

NEW YORK. (P)—A Protestant Episcopal Church body has reaffirmed four church doctrines as the basis of unity with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America or any other interested Christian body.

The restatement of these four basic principles as the minimum belief upon which unity could be obtained was contained in a report made by the joint commission on approaches at the request of the 1946 triennial convention of the church in Philadelphia.

It will be submitted to the Lambeth conference of bishops of churches of the Anglican communion throughout the world in London July 4 to August 8 "for consideration and advice." The Lambeth conference is an advisory body, without legislative authority.

The four basic doctrines give the old and new testaments as the rule of faith; the Apostles' creed as the symbol of baptism and the Nicene creed as a sufficient statement of faith, the ministering of the Sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper; and the governing of the churches by the bishops.
