EPSILON SIGMA ALPHA HOLDS PLEDGE DINNER AT CARL'S HAVEN

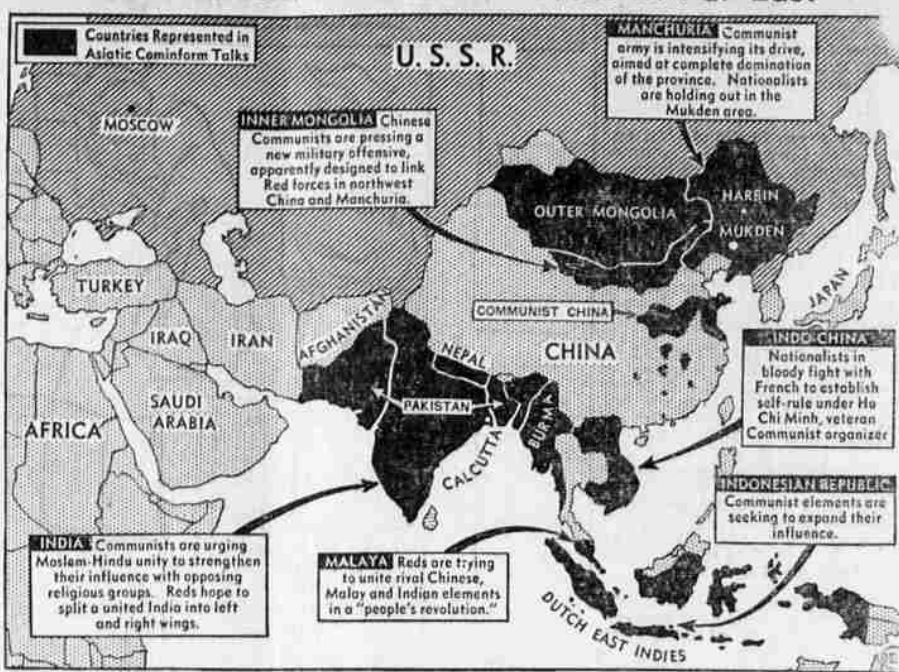
Thursday evening, March 18, Alpha Chi Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha held their spring pledge dinner at Carl's Haven.

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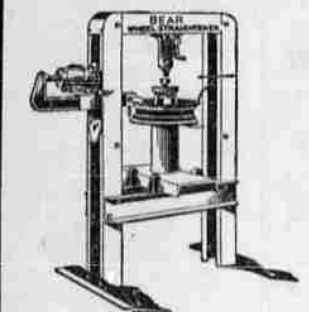
