

Hessell Defeats Dorsetti; Dusette Flattens Lipscomb

With his flair for showing off, Joe Dorsetti unhesitatingly took several minutes in removing his glittering ear pendants and gaudy robe for the head-line mat bout at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night, but his opponent, Gordon Hessell, took hardly more than 30 seconds in flattening Joe for the first fall. At the sound of the gong, Dorsetti rushed at Hessell, who had begun fussing with his robe in a delaying maneuver of his own; but instead of being caught off guard, Hessell met "Gypsy Joe" with a right hand smash to the button that scored a stunning knockout, and immediately followed it with a body press. A crowd of nearly 900 fans roared approval.

Dorsetti evened the tally in the second canto after twice being hurled through the ropes, the second time landing on the floor. The tough session was ended when Dorsetti "softened" Hessell with a series of drop kicks, applied his unbreakable hangman's clamp and, for extra measure, kicked his foe in the back as he lay helpless on the mat. Time: 15:47.

The third and final round was a replica of the second in roughness that kept Referee Elton Owen in almost as much action as the grapplers. Capping a duel of stomach butting in the ring corners, Hessell subdued Joe with his reverse flying head scissors in 11:10, thereby retaining his Pacific Northwest light-heavyweight championship belt.

Georges Dusette and his full

nelson hold disposed of Jack Lipscomb in 18:45 in the lone fall of the semi-final. Glen Knox, hairless-headed meekie from Tennessee, made his debut on the local mat in the program opener by pinning George Curtis in 7:58 with a back-breaker.

Wildlife Stamps Being Mailed To Oregon Sportsmen

Hundreds of Oregon sportsmen will receive through the mails this week the 1948 issue of Wildlife Conservation Stamps, sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation in celebration of National Wildlife Restoration Week. Money received from the sale of stamps is to be used by the federation in promoting conservation through legislation and education.

The National Federation has placed a course of conservation study in grades three to eight in the schools of many states. It provides public information and education through lectures, films, radio and news releases, etc. It sponsored the Pittman-Robertson Act which appropriates to states ten per cent of excise taxes on sporting goods and ammunition, and is active in all phases of conservation legislation.

In connection with National Wildlife Restoration week the Federation issues each year a series of poster stamps with appropriate descriptive albums, the stamp sale being the organization's principal source of revenue.

The Roseburg Rod and Gun Club is affiliated with the Oregon Wildlife Federation, an association of clubs interested in conservation, and the state organization, in turn, is a member of the national federation.

Oakland combined timely hitting and effective pitching by Will Haas to win the opener from Portland, 6-5. Oakland came from behind in the fourth frame and jumped on southpaw Helsar for five hits and four runs, but the winning run was manufactured in the seventh when Eiten singled and drove in Christopher.

Portland took the nightcap by the same score, first baseman Mole socking two home runs. Bridges surprised a last inning Oakland rally after two runs had counted. The teams split their series at three games each.

San Diego took the opener from Los Angeles, 6 to 4, and the Angels the nightcap, 7 to 1. Catcher Kuper clinched the opener for the Padres with a three-run homer in the eighth.

Sacramento's doubleheader with the San Francisco Seals was called off in Sacramento because of rain. These teams played only three games in their series, the Seals winning all.

San Francisco goes to Hollywood for this week's series; Los Angeles engages Oakland in the Bay City; Seattle moves on to Sacramento; and Portland takes on San Diego at the border.

NEW YORK, April 5.—(AP)—Mrs. John D. Rockefeller, Jr., died today at her home of a heart attack.

Mrs. Rockefeller was the former Abby Green Aldrich, daughter of U. S. Sen. Nelson W. Aldrich of Rhode Island. She married the present head of the famous Rockefeller family in 1901.

They have five sons—John D. III, Laurence, Winthrop and David—and a daughter—Abby. Mrs. Rockefeller was a sister of Winthrop Aldrich, the noted banker.
