a concert of sacred and familiar
music in the Sutherlin Methodist
Church Thursday, April 8, at 8
p. m. The program will include
an oratorio, "The Life of Christ,"
as well as folk melodies and se-
lections from his own works.

Roth is the composer of such
songs as "In My Heart There
Rings a Melody," "How Can I
Help But Love Him," "Let Thy
Light of Freedom Shine," "Lost
in Wonder," "Heaven is Not
Far Away," "The Pilgrim Road,"
"I'm Lonesome Here," "Let Life
Be Lovely as a Rose," "After
Till" and "The End of the Road."
In his youth, Roth began to
prepare himself for his chosen
ministry. He graduated from
schools of music and theology
and continued the study and
composition of all forms of
church music.

Following years of experience
as a music instructor in religious
institutions, high schools and
colleges, as soloist and as instru-
tor of church and festival choirs,
he entered upon a wider minis-
try in singing, and of concertizing
his nationally famous Ec-
clesia Choir.

The visit to Sutherlin is part
of Roth's sixth American tour.

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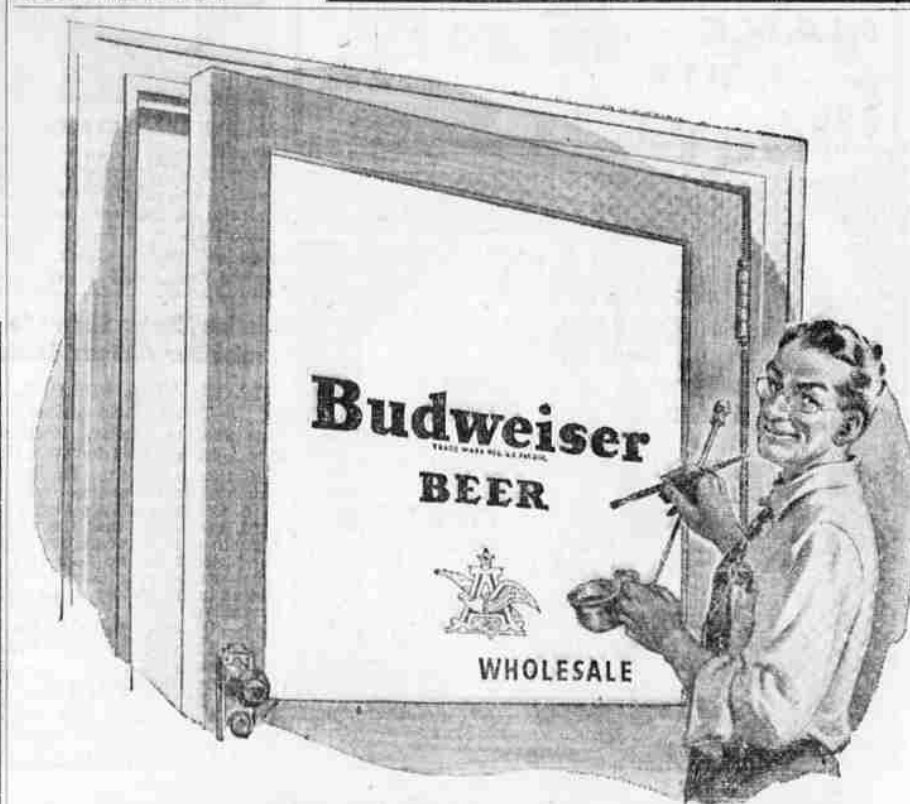
