

Training Classes Dated to Promote Amateur Boxing

All youths, amateurs or professionals, interested in boxing are urged to be present at training classes to be conducted in the gymnasium under the high school field grandstand each afternoon from 2:30 to 5 and evenings from 7 to 9, starting Thursday.

The classes, to be directed by competent physical education instructors, are being sponsored by the Police Association, announces Police Chief Calvin Baird and Bill Olsen, a member of the force.

It is emphasized, however, that members of the police force are participating strictly as individuals and that neither the city nor Police Department has any interest in the program.

The work of the association, members point out, is to promote interest in amateur boxing to train youths in the art of self defense, and to enter these showing interest and capabilities in amateur boxing engagements.

Dallas Bennett of Roseburg, who will be featured in the main event of a professional fight card here against Si "Tiger" Jones of Portland the latter part of April, will be one of the instructors.

Rudy Schlotthauer local taxi driver, and Olsen, who are promoting the pro card, will also serve as instructors. Bennett will be holding workouts at the gym each afternoon and evening.

The Police Benefit Association announced that a strictly benefit boxing card has been scheduled for June, with Bennett tentative to meet a member of the police force from Grants Pass in the main event. Proceeds will be used to promote amateur boxing in the city.

Joe Kahut Given Nod Over Hawkins

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—Joe Kahut of Woodburn, Ore., easily outboxed Tacoma's Roy Hawkins last night for a unanimous 10-round decision.

Hawkins won only one heat, the second. Kahut, outweighted 191 to 187, won all the rest handily and floored the Tacoma man for a nine count in the fifth.

Hawkins stayed in the bout

after the knock down on sheer stamina. There were many in the crowd of 4,600 fans who believed the Tacoma fighter should never have been permitted to go against Kahut.

The first round was even. Neither opened up. The second went to Hawkins, who kept jabbing at Kahut with ineffectual lefts while Joe watched for an opening. In the third Kahut unleashed his assault and after that it was Kahut without any doubt. He sinfully waded into the seemingly defenseless Hawkins with bruising lefts and rights.

Dusette, Katonen Will Grapple For Crack at Stojack

The No. 1 challenger for Frankie Stojack's Pacific Coast junior heavyweight wrestling crown will come out of the headline match on Promoter Don Owen's weekly mat show at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

Owen announced here Wednesday that he had signed two of the greatest grapplers in the business, Georges Dusette and Paavo Katonen, for his main event, and pointed out that either of the scientific grapplers are capable of measuring the Tacoma cabinet maker.

Dusette proved his prowess here several weeks ago by defeating Stojack in a non-title skirmish and more recently Katonen battled Gordon Hessel on even terms until disqualified. Hessel, incidentally, continued on his merry way as current king of all Northwest matmen by making a successful title defense against Joe Dorsetti here last week.

There may be no blazing speed in Saturday's main attraction, but the two principals know all of the answers in the limb bending business. Dusette will, of course, depend on his amazing shoulder and forearm strength to apply his deadly full-Nelson.

Katonen, on the other hand, will likely employ his Greco-Roman style of grappling—body locks, flying hip locks and the rest of his close-in wrestling.

Dusette, the popular French-Canadian, displayed fine form here last week in defeating Jack Thomscomb in a preliminary bout. Whether the powerful matman can avoid Katonen's handman hold remains the big question.

There will be only one other match, but the principals of the one-hour preliminary are main-eventers on any card in the nation—Joe Lyman of Redmond and "The Phantom," a highly touted mystery man of the mat who has just arrived after a lengthy and successful campaign in Honolulu.

The two one-hour tilts provide one of the most attractive programs of the season and is certain to attract a near-capacity attendance.

Portland advanced to second place in the standings by trimming San Diego, 4 to 3, but had to stave off a ninth-inning rally that saw the Padres score twice. Storey and Mole blasted home runs for the Beavers.

ing victory in the Coast League as Seattle went 11 innings to nose out Sacramento, 4 to 3. Novikoff's home run in the first inning was good for three Seattle runs, but Salvesson pitched brilliantly the rest of the way. Infield gave Seattle its winning run.

Fred Ladd of Salem, N. Y., was to meet Mart Dwyer of Troy, nearly 30 years his junior, last night. But the bout was canceled when Ladd announced he was retiring on the advice of physicians.

Ladd and Dwyer were spectators at a professional boxing show here and got into an argument. They were parted by police. No one was hurt.
