

Truman Asks Funds to Expand Air Forces

augment the \$11,000,000,000 already budgeted for defense. The extra air force funds are for aircraft purchases, research and development.

2. Rep. Clason (R-Mass.) announced his armed services subcommittee would begin hearings on legislation to expand the air force from 55 to 70 combat groups.

3. The Senate armed services

committee weighed a "formal request" by Secretary for Air Symington for a 70-group air force.

Draft Tie-In Mulled

Members of the Senate Committee confided after the closed door session yesterday that they are considering linking the air force expansion with a temporary draft. They indicated UMT action would be delayed for the time being.

Senator Maybank told a reporter: "I think we can work out a plan for the 70-group air combat

plan without its costing too much."

And Senator Byrd said he will support such an increase if an extra \$1,800,000,000 will cover the cost. He said the armada plan "is something Russia will understand more than anything else."

Secretary of Defense Forrestal, who has opposed the air force boost as too costly, sat in on the committee session but declined comment afterwards.

Russians Turn Sour on Berlin Plane Tragedy

to 12 western allied nations.

Russia despite the crucial April 18 Italian elections appeared ready to veto Italy's application for membership in the United Nations. She insists that all former German allies, including Finland, Romania, Hungary and Bulgaria, be admitted in a bloc.

Moscow accused Italy of two peace treaty violations. Tass, the Soviet news agency attacked the Rome government's plans for 400,000 watchers at the polls. Implying that the poll watchers would be armed, it said Italy thus violated the clause limiting her armed and police forces to 300,000. Tass said the other violation lay in installation of machineguns on Italian cargo vessels.

Italy's Communists attacked the letter-writing campaign of Italian-Americans in the United States urging defeat of the Communists in the elections.

In the Trieste free territory, the British and Americans announced limited power will be transferred to local civilian hands in the zone Monday, but Communists will be barred from taking part.

"Nasty Move" At U. S.

The Russians have demanded that U. S. forces in Austria remove their radio range station from Tullin air base from its present location in the Soviet zone of Occupation, American authorities announced.

A U. S. spokesman said this would not necessarily mean a four-power situation in Vienna similar to the Berlin crisis. He said it indicated only that "the Russians have found a new way to be nasty to us."

The spokesman said the Russians demanded the removal of

the station on the grounds they lack sufficient troops to guard it. He said, however, that the Russians never guarded the station, which is operated by remote control from Tullin air base, five miles away.

The Russian-controlled Berlin radio said last night Sotolovsky had promised to do away with Soviet secret arrest and trial of Germans.

He did so, it reported, in reply to appeals from Communist leaders.

The western powers have charged that thousands of Germans are being held without trial in Soviet-zone concentration camps.

Dispatches in Berlin's socialist press this morning said a new wave of arrests against anti-Communists was being conducted in the Russian zone.

adding to the 10 he got there earlier. New York has given him 90 and New Hampshire 8.

Stassen holds the second spot in the delegate totals with 46, on the basis of 19 in Wisconsin, 25 in Minnesota and two in New Hampshire.

Vanderberg, who has said he does not want the nomination, is third with Michigan's 41. Of the total picked so far, 102 are uncommitted. It takes 548 to nominate.

Taft Draws Demo Reply

Taft wound up his Nebraska campaign with reiterated emphasis on the preparedness theme he stressed in most of his 14 barnstorming talks. He told a Fremont audience he wants a powerful air force and, while opposed to universal military training, he thinks a temporary return to the draft may be necessary.

Democratic National Chairman J. Howard McGrath took issue with Taft's preparedness stand. Noting that the Ohio Senator has been quoted as saying he knows of no Russian intention for military aggression, McGrath told a Portland, Ore., audience: "If he knew the facts, he certainly would be advocating rather than opposing such measures of American preparedness as universal military training."

McGrath devoted the major part of his speech to an attack on Henry A. Wallace, the third party candidate. He said Wallace is "talking the same language, with the same reasoning," as Communist Earl Browder.

Wallace meanwhile was telling an Indianapolis audience that Americans "are the victims of a deliberate campaign to create fear."

The former vice president departed from his text to deny reports that he might quit the race "if certain Democrats were nominated."

M'Arthur Drive Fails

Reports from the four California counties where petitions were filed to place Gen. Douglas MacArthur's name in the June 1 presidential primary showed that they failed to obtain the required number of signatures.

With 7,352 signatures necessary to get MacArthur's name on the Republican ballot, Allen H. Worcester, who headed the movement contrary to the general's

expressed wishes, said the drive had failed.
