Coal Burning Railway Service Cut in Half

mally handle about 45 per cent of the passenger trains and 65 per cent of the freight service.

The strike has crippled operations in other industries, especially steel. In all, approximately 164,000 workers in various fields are idle in addition to the 400,000 soft coal miners.

Rep. Hartley told reporters the possibility of further congressional action aimed at Lewis hinges on what happens to the union leader when he answers a contempt citation in court Monday.

"If it develops that the Taft-Hartley law is adequate to deal with him, I'll proceed with hearings immediately," Hartley said.

The White House, in the meantime, said it had no comment on a published report that the administration has given up hope of ending the strike within the next 10 days.

President Truman said yesterday that the administration is going to enforce the Taft-Hartley law to the letter in an attempt to end the coal strike.

Mr. Truman told a news conference that was all the comment he cared to make about the 25-day-old walkout of Lewis' coal miners.

As the president spoke, the Southern Coal Producers Association filed a complaint with the National Labor Relations Board accusing Lewis of violating the Taft-Hartley act by refusing to bargain with its president.

Hartley said that if he decided a tougher law is necessary his committee's first move will be to act on a proposed amendment to apply the Sherman anti-trust law to labor unions.

"There's no reason why the anti-trust laws shouldn't apply to labor monopolies exactly as they do to business monopolies," he said.

"This would take in industry-wide strikes, the lawmaker added.

Rodeo Queen To Be Chosen May 2

Queen of the 4th annual Douglas County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo will be chosen at 10 a. m. Sunday, May 2, at the County Fairgrounds, it was announced today by Dick Baker, rodeo superintendent.

All single girls between 16 and 22 are eligible to compete. They must furnish their own mounts. Judging will be by a secret posse committee, on the basis of ability to ride, horsemanship and appearance.

The last group of companions gave up on the final leg of the journey when snowstorms got heavy.

Meissner, who made the trip "just to see if I can do it," started from Mt. Hood Feb. 18.
