Claire A. Argow Is Guest Speaker of Junior Woman's Club

Claire A. Argow, executive secretary of the Oregon Prison Association, was guest speaker at the Junior Woman's Club meeting Monday night at the armory, at which time the past contact chairmen of the club were guests of honor, and the Roseburg Woman's Club members were special guests.

Mrs. Argow, one of the most commanding and inspired speakers to be heard in Roseburg, has the undisputed reputation of being one of the most outstanding women in this country regarding juvenile delinquency and prison reforms. She was graduated from Vassar College and has continued her education with refresher courses, one of which was taken at Yale on the study of alcoholics. Her thorough knowledge of her subject and her earnest desire to improve present situations in the Boys Training School at Woodburn and the Oregon State Penitentiary, has already wrought many improvements. She is greatly concerned with the large number of young boys in the state, as well as throughout the nation, who through various circumstances have become involved with the law and of the present handling of these cases. Her ardent work gained the support of the Junior Woman's Clubs throughout the state during the last year.

Following a honeymoon at the coast, the couple will make their home in Eugene.



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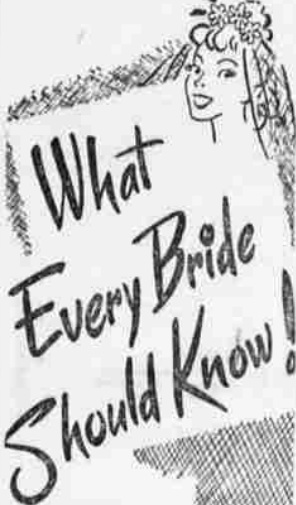
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
