New Oil Field In Canada Bubbling With 53 Wells

Leduc, Alta., (AP)—Canada's newest oil field is bubbling up to expectations. When drillers spudded in the first well of the big Leduc field in November, 1946, they said: "It looks good."

The hits chattered into the ground and on Feb. 13, 1947, the well kicked in its first supply. From then on the drillers and riggers and tool men swarmed over the Leduc. They made it the start of the biggest oil ex-

ploration program in Canada's history.

Today there are 53 going wells in the Leduc field, located about 18 miles south of Edmonton in the western province of Alberta.

The 53 wells produce a daily average of 5,800 barrels. But the flow is held to 100 or 150 barrels a day under conservation measures. Canada imports 90 per cent of her oil and is taking no chances.

Estimates of the Leduc reserve run from 100,000,000 to 200,000,000 barrels.

Some 12,000 acres have been proven in the Leduc area. Nearly all the big oil companies are spending a lot of money in oil exploration.
