

Anti-Communist Move Opposed at Bogota Meeting

BOGOTA, Columbia, April 9.—(AP)—The Pan American conference bogged down today in its efforts to obtain unanimous support of a resolution against communism.

A Chilean source said Chile plans to ask the American nations next week to approve her anti-Communist resolution, even if there is no unanimity.

Last week Chile distributed among the delegates a draft calling for condemnation of what it termed foreign-inspired subversive activities. Chile asked the Pan American delegates to suggest changes they might deem necessary.

The Chilean source said the resolution had not been submitted to the conference because efforts still are being made to achieve unanimous approval in advance. Some nations have opposed bringing the matter before the parley unless assurance of such unanimity is obtained.

Further, the Chilean informant said Mexico and Venezuela had not decided whether they will support the resolution in the form it has been suggested by Chile.

The two nations are reported to oppose the conference directing individual governments on what action to take against Communism.

Other delegations are said to be against the present wording of the proposed resolution.

The secretary of the conference informed the delegates that President Truman asked congress yesterday to increase the United States export-import bank's lending authority by \$500,000,000 so it can provide more funds for Latin America.

Argentine and Mexican delegate expressed pleasure over the president's move. Juan Bramuglia of Argentina called it "one more contribution toward continental solidarity."

Murder Charge Facing Wife Who Slew on Dare

OKANOGAN, Wash., April 9.—(AP)—A 27-year-old housewife, who told police her husband slugged her face and dared her to shoot him, was charged today with second degree murder.

Prosecutor John Hancock said the woman, Mrs. Dorothy Marschewka, related in a statement that her husband, Arthur, 27, had been drinking and become abusive after they quarreled.

She said he placed a loaded .22 caliber rifle in her hand, slugged her face, called her vile names and dared her to shoot him.

He was shot through the heart. A note found by investigators asked that the wife not be prosecuted if Marschewka was found shot, the prosecutor said.

Molotov Facing Ouster Possibility, Assertion

LONDON, April 8.—(AP)—News-Review, a weekly magazine, says the ouster of V. M. Molotov as Russian foreign minister "may shortly have to be considered as a possibility." There was no confirmation of this report in other quarters today.

Some students of Russian politics classify Molotov as the No. 1 candidate for Prime Minister Stalin's job when Stalin dies.

News-Review said Molotov's program was criticized at a February meeting of the Politburo, but Molotov later received a vote of confidence. The Politburo, headed by Stalin, includes the top leaders of the Soviet Union.

Janitor Often Top Faculty Member, Educators Told

SPOKANE, (AP)—A New York editor told northwest educators here that "we have more schools and colleges than any other nation on earth, but only too often the finest member of the faculty is the janitor."

John Mason Brown, associate editor of the Saturday Review of Literature, told the Inland Empire Education Association convention that "it is regrettable that our teachers lack the ability to function with the same efficiency as the average janitor."

"There are many reasons for this condition," Brown said, "and the chief of these is that the teaching profession is the most abominably treated and underpaid in our country. The teacher is mistreated by the state, the city and the parents, who are more interested than anything in ridding their living rooms of their offspring."

He said education is to blame for a "just for mediocrity" he called characteristic of the average American.

America is skilled in producing gadgets and technicians, he said, but the world "is wondering why we are so intent on saving time only to waste it."

Students Wreck Political Offices in High School

WINDSOR, Ont., April 9.—(AP)—A group of angered students who objected to their high school being used for Labor-Progressive Party meetings wrecked the party headquarters Wednesday night, police reported.

Officers said three party officials were hurt slightly as more than 500 young people paraded through the downtown area and smashed through barricades to invade the second-floor offices. There they pushed over furniture, dumped files on the floor, and tore up papers.

They were dispersed by police.
