Judge E. Barrett Prettyman dissented.

Robert N. Denham, NLRB general counsel, said the decision strengthens the hand of the communists in dealing with the Communists in labor. He told a reporter that "every effort should be made to expunge Communists from the labor movement."

## Appeal to Be Filed

In New York, a spokesman for the union's attorney said the case will be taken to the Supreme Court—the only court which can give a final decision on the con-

stitutionality of the provision. The three-judge court's majority opinion said: "Instead of being convinced beyond reasonable doubt that Section 9 (H) of the statute is void for violating the basic law (constitution), we hold the considered view that the subsection is a constitutional exercise of congressional power to prescribe qualifications which must be proved by those who ask to enjoy the extraordinary privilege of acting as exclusive bargaining agent. "It would be unrealistic to say, in the light of all that appears, that the presence of Communists in key positions in labor relations does not constitute a clearly discernible and imminent threat to important national interests."

The body will be shipped to San Diego by the Roseburg Funeral Home for funeral services and interment.

## Bids Asked on State Office Building, Salem

SALEM, Ore., April 13—(AP)—The State Board of Control called for bids today on the proposed \$2,000,000 five-story state office building in Salem.

The new building will house the State Public Utilities Commissioner's office, Industrial Accident Commission, State Police and Board of Control.

The money for the building will be borrowed from school funds. Rentals charged against departments will pay back the money plus interest.

The building, 223 by 152 feet, will be located across the street from the front entrance to the capitol.

It will cost about double the original pre-war estimate.

## Lumber Prices Dropping, Federal Report Notes

WASHINGTON, April 13—(AP)—Lumber prices apparently are "receding from their all-time highs," the Commerce Department said today.

It added that future prices will depend mostly on the extent of domestic construction and "the willingness or determination of lumber consumers to defer their use until prices have been re-adjusted."

The department's report said foreign needs under the European recovery program are "not expected to be greatly above the rate of United States exports during the middle of 1947." These averaged about 400,000,000 board feet a quarter.
