SCHOOL BUDGET ELECTION

Eligible voters in the Roseburg school district will be called upon Friday to pass on the budget proposed for the 1948-49 fiscal year. This budget for the first time in history will, if approved, pass the half-million dollar mark.

The new budget will propose that \$202,360.35 be raised over and above the amount which could be levied inside the six per cent limitation. The Oregon law provides that levies imposed by any municipal corporation shall not be increased by more than six per cent from any one of the three preceding years.

Schools and local government offer tough financial problems in a rapidly growing community. Taxes levied this year will not be collected until November. They will be based upon valuations assessed during the past year, up to and including the month of March of this year.

Even an adequate operating budget would not relieve our school problem entirely. In addition to increasing annual operating expenditures, we must be thinking as well of the necessity for expanded facilities.

Our present Senior High School will accommodate only 420 pupils under educational standards set by the State Department of Education. But present enrollment is 578, while 650 is the anticipated enrollment for next year.

Some people may not agree with the limitations set by the State Department of Education, but regardless of whether there is agreement the fact remains that the department has authority to enforce its standards and that's that.

As to eligibility of voters, any person may vote who has been a resident of Oregon for six months and who has lived within the school district 30 days and who pays taxes as listed on the county tax rolls, or who owns stock in a corporation doing business and paying taxes in the school district.

Eliza Anne Tipton, Douglas Resident For 63 Years, Dies

Mrs. Eliza Anne Tipton, widow of the late William C. Tipton, for 63 years a resident of Douglas County, died Monday, April 12, after a brief illness at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George Williams, 807 Blair Avenue, Piedmont, Calif.

The former Eliza Anne May was born in Missouri, July 6, 1856, the daughter of Abram and Telitha May. In 1861 the family moved to Iowa, where plans were completed for the move across the plains to Oregon.

The Mays' first stopping place in Oregon was on the site of the city of La Grande. The summer of 1863 was spent gold mining in Eastern Oregon.

After returning to Douglas County, Eliza Anne May was married in 1883 to the late William C. Tipton, also an early pioneer, who died in 1921. The Tiptons lived 18 years on a farm near Glide. While at Glide she and the traveling minister, Rev. William Thornton, organized the First Baptist Church at Oak Creek.

The mother of six children, two of whom died in infancy, Mrs. Tipton is survived by Alvin A. and Cleo T. Tipton, Roseburg; Vera Tipton Williams, Piedmont, Calif.; Elberta Tipton Elliott, Boston, Mass.; three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
