## Hatred For Long Hard Toil Explains National Greatness

NEW YORK.—(AP)—America, more than any other country in the world, is a land where people expect something for nothing or a lot for a little.

This philosophy makes for such unhappiness and has its detrimental moral aspects—but it also helps explain our national greatness.

Hatred for long, hard labor is international but here in America it amounts to a passion. The result is our industrial civilization.

We like to think that "The Used Is Always Bright" and "Early to Bed, Early to Rise, Makes a Man Healthy, Wealthy and Wise."

But if an unprejudiced man from Mars arrived here to study our way of life he probably would reach the conclusion that our real guiding proverb were:

(1) "Nothing ventured, nothing gained."  
(2) "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy."

The desire to get something for nothing, or much for little, is probably one of the most deeply rooted human characteristics. Wartime Looting Hysteria.

In wartime this showed up conspicuously in the looting done by all armies, Allied as well as enemy. I saw honorable men who had lived all their lives in honest, go delirious with joy as they pawed through rubble homes for souvenirs of any kind to send the folks back home. They were seized, as by a mania, with the guilty but ecstatic happiness of grabbing up gimcracks that didn't belong to them—things they wouldn't have in their houses if they cost a nickel of their own money. But they perspired with pleasure over getting anything they hadn't paid for with their own sweat.

This has always been true, and the only way to change it would be to repeal human nature.

But in Europe the cream has long been drawn off. The common man—except in countries where he is reaching for Communism's promised pie-in-the-sky—is born to the tradition that he must work hard to get little.

In America the cream stands in the bottle. Some cream at least. The working man still is influenced less by the idea of security than by the principle "take a chance—you may strike it rich."

**Rich To Gain Leisure**

Here the man who lives by brain or hand doesn't want calouses on either. He works chiefly to gain leisure—although he hasn't learned yet how to use his present leisure well. But he wants more time to play and

**LETTER FROM WASHINGTON**

The agency which will handle the European Recovery Program is officially known as the Economic Cooperation Administration. It will undoubtedly be referred to as the ECA. Mr. Paul G. Hoffman, well-known head of the Studebaker Corporation, was named administrator and confirmed by the Senate. The ECA is housed in the Mallico Building, Connecticut Avenue and H Street, N. W., Washington, D. C.

It is anticipated that the program will require the employment of 1,000 people serving in the United States, and approximately 400 overseas. Thousands of letters of application for employment have already been received. The biggest immediate problem is to obtain personnel of the highest possible quality. Top executives totaling 75 may be paid up to the limit of salaries established under what is called the Classification Act, or 25 may be paid up to \$15,000 per year. Temporarily, personnel from the existing departments of government will be used. Meanwhile, the State Department is accepting applications for employment. These will be forwarded to the ECA. Those who wish to apply for positions may do so now by sending their applications to Mr. Arch K. Jean, Chief of the Division of Personnel, State Department, Washington, D. C.

The relief part of the program will be carried on pretty much as now set up. The recovery phase, or in other words, the part of the program designed to assist business in Europe get on its feet, cannot be developed until the administrator has completed his organization. He has received his appropriations, and has completed the basic agreements with the participating nations. Actual procurement of recovery items will not begin until these steps have been completed.

**Business as Usual Course**  
In the law, Congress specified maximum use of normal trade channels in carrying out the program. The administrator will not assume responsibility for determining the recovery needs of the various participating countries, nor will he act as a procurement agent for them. The initial steps will be taken by the countries themselves and will be taken up by the agencies which those countries establish after the basic agreements have been worked out. The administrator will function as a reviewing and approving agent. It is anticipated that American business will operate through its normal outlets abroad.
