D. R. Dimick Joins Winston, Weyman In Law Practice

Daniel R. Dimick, until recently National Labor Relations Board regional attorney and chief law officer for Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Alaska, with headquarters in Seattle, this week became associated in the practice of law with Harrison R. Winston and Harold A. Weyman at 405 Pacific Building.

Dimick obtained his bachelor and law degrees at the University of Oregon school of law in 1937. At the University, where he studied under Senator Wayne L. Morse, he was in charge of the Oregon office of the United States attorney general's survey of release procedures. Also, for two years, he was business manager of the Oregon Law Review, to which he contributed a number of legal articles.

He is a member of the bar of the Oregon supreme court of the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the ninth circuit and was admitted to practice before the supreme court of the United States in 1941. He worked with the NLRB in New York City and Washington, D. C., prior to entering the navy in December 1942.

War Veteran
Commissioned a lieutenant junior grade, he served as an air corps intelligence officer in World War II, assigned immediately to the Pacific area, where he worked almost exclusively with radar. He held the position of flag lieutenant and secretary to Admiral Charles P. Cecil, U. S. N., commanding officer of the Pacific Fleet radar center. Advanced to lieutenant commander, he served with Admiral Cecil until the latter was killed in an air crash. Dimick was then transferred to Santa Rosa, Calif., where he remained until released in February, 1946.

Mr. Dimick is married, has a daughter, Gay, age two and a half years, and a son, Chris, age nine months. He has purchased a home at 902 Nebo Street.

Bank Deposit Marathon Records New-Born Babe

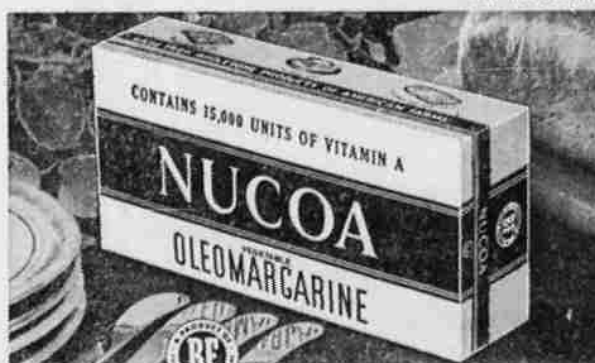
