Teen Age Club At Canyonville To Get Boost

Roseburg, Grants Pass Entertainers Will Take Part in Dedication

Entertainers from Grants Pass and Roseburg will participate in the dedication at 7 p. m. Saturday of the Canyonville Teen Time Club, organized under sponsorship of the Canyonville school board, at Canyonville, Douglas County. It was announced by Arthur Edward Dahl, Canyonville police chief.

Highlight of the dedication program will be a floor show to be staged by the Grants Pass Hi Teeners, with Bob Byrd as master of ceremonies. The program will be broadcast for 45 minutes, starting at 7:15, by KRNR, which will relay the broadcast to KUIN at Grants Pass.

Festivities will include an afternoon air show to be presented by William Lyle Cox, manager of the Tri-City Airport, and antics of the Grants Pass Cavemen, who will appear on the streets in the afternoon and at the evening program in the high school gymnasium.

Official guests will include Carl Dallas, chief of police at Grants Pass; City Manager M. W. Slankard of Roseburg; Mr. and Mrs. Hank Dickson, sponsors of the Grants Pass Hi Teen Club; Glen Nichols, Radio Station KUIN, and Iris Helliwell, Leroy Hiatt and Del McKay, Radio Station KRNR.

Teen-agers from Mertie Creek, Riddle, Days Creek, Glendale, and the Canyonville area are invited to the affair and to use the club, Dahl said. Various games have been furnished for entertainment. Prizes have been donated by merchants for the opening night.

Rules Set Forth
Dahl said that the Canyonville Teen Time Club is modeled after the Grants Pass Hi Teen Club. Purpose will be to give the children a place to come each Saturday for amusement. The club

will be sustained by membership dues and be under the supervision of a committee selected for their interest in the young people.

Rules are that if children come to the club, they must remain until closing time. They cannot leave earlier, unless their parents call in person to get them. Dress will be informal for both boys and girls. Girls, however, must not wear slacks.

Membership dues of 50 cents a year will go toward the purchase of new records for the juke box, and the purchase of candy and soft drinks to be sold within the club.

Although the club is organized exclusively for the teen-agers, parents will be welcomed as observers. Parents may not dance together on the floor, but they may dance with any of the children who may ask them, Dahl said.

The supervisory committee, responsible to the school board which has donated use of the high school gymnasium for the club, includes Lawrence Boyles, superintendent of schools; Claude Phillips, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence E. Parker and Dahl.

In the United Nations were looked on as clingers against the leftists. Some think the Communists won't get more than 30 to 35 per cent of the vote; possibly less.

Togliatti and his party have found it harder and harder to convince the Italians they should be against American aid in the face of hundreds of American ships arriving with goods. And the passage of the \$5,300,000,000 European recovery bill by the U. S. Congress was considered by many as a body blow to the Communists.

Facism Gains Ground
Last night in Rome's Tiburtino square the Communists battled Italy's fascist-minded national Italian socialists (MSI). Hunks of concrete were thrown. Six persons were injured and the MSI was routed.

The MSI, which has taken hold in Italy's conservative south, lost out in the street battle, but its ranks have been swelled in the nation. It now claims 200,000 members and 1,300,000 followers. Communists in Trieste continued the physical battle against
