

Practice of Law Begun in Roseburg By Fred Bernau

Fred Bernau, formerly of Salem, recently started the practice of law in Roseburg. After serving 3 1/2 years in the Army, he was graduated last year from Willamette University College of Law with an LL. B. degree.

Bernau is a graduate of Hillsboro High School. He is the son of Frederick John Bernau, whose registered Jersey cattle farm, south of Portland, he left in 1937 to enter Willamette University. He majored there in liberal arts and political science, earning his B. A. degree in 1941.

During his military service,

Bernau saw duty in the Philippine Islands. He was commissioned a second lieutenant at the field artillery candidate school at Fort Sill, Okla., but left the Army as a first lieutenant in the adjutant general's department.

Bernau said he chose Roseburg as a place to locate because it seemed "the most attractive city in the state" as a place to live. His office is located at 129 N. Jackson St., above the Fullerton Drug Store.

While at Willamette University Bernau was a member of Phi Delta Theta fraternity and the "Blue Key," campus activity honorary. He served as editor of the Collegian, weekly campus newspaper. Since locating in Roseburg, he has been active in the Young Republican Club and a member of the Officers Reserve Corps.

Mavis Hasbargen Chosen Head Of Safety Council

Miss Mavis Hasbargen Thursday night was chosen chairman of the Douglas County Safety Council at a meeting of interested citizens and representatives of several civic organizations in Superintendent of Schools Paul Elliott's office.

Miss Hasbargen, as chairman of the Business and Professional Woman's Club's safety committee, has been active in promoting the organization of a safety council here. Her name will be recommended for the appointment to the Governor's Traffic Safety Council, Salem, of which the Douglas County chapter will be a part.

The aim of the state council, which has the backing of the governor and the secretary of state, is to organize councils in every county, so that the state organization will bear weight in bringing about safety legislation.

Similarly the county groups

will function as a citizen's committee in promoting safety measures for the respective towns and the highways in the county.

While the support of all safety minded individuals and service clubs will be solicited, the council will be made up of the general chairman and seven committee heads, namely: engineering, education, legislative, public information, enforcement, traffic courts and ways and means, the duties of each being clearly defined in the by-laws.

A proposed constitution and by-laws was read and discussed at the meeting, but no action was taken. A meeting has been called for Thursday of next week at 8 p. m., the place of which will be announced later, for the purpose of completing the organization, naming the committee chairmen, adopting the constitution and by-laws, and shaping a program of procedure.

Scouts of Douglas Early in Getting Quota Increase

Believed to be the first, or at least one of the first, to make its membership increase quota, the Douglas County Boy Scout district has already in a little over three months gone over the top, announced Harold S. Yivisaker, district scout executive.

The year's quota of 138 has already been exceeded. Rosters of newly organized troops sent in to the state headquarters bring the present total to 740, compared with 590 at the close of last year, or an approximate 25 per cent gain. Eight new packs have been added for a total of 28. Four more troops are in the process of organizing.

While there will be some fluctuation in Scout enrollment, it is anticipated that the number by the end of the year will remain considerably above the quota set.

Mr. Yivisaker said that, while Douglas County may have been a bit greener field to work in than some districts, the interest among parents and scout leaders has been very encouraging.

Clyde Olmscheid Wins Top Honors In Arts Exhibit

Clyde Olmscheid, Roseburg High senior, was the grand champion winner, taking first place honors in cabinet making, novelty project and group projects (advanced), in final judging of the student arts exhibit.

The students are now on display up town in the windows of four stores, Pernoy's, Millor's, Montgomery Ward, and the display window at R. L. Hickerson's service station, all on Jackson street. They will remain in the windows through Saturday.

Fifteen boys in the school participated and 21 ribbons were presented. Four of the students won more than one prize. Five boys received honorable mention for their contributions.

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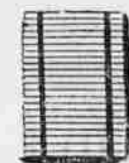
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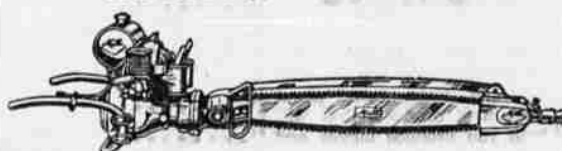
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
