He first described early examples of jewelry which were usually cumbersome and crudely made. Then, starting with a rough sample of agate, he illustrated how it was cut, shaped into a blank, sanded, buffed and polished, to finally become an appealingly beautiful ring set. He next described how the ring itself was fashioned from sheet and wire stock of sterling silver.

Mr. Toater is an expert at making fine jewelry and thoroughly understands his subject. His directions were clear, simple and to the point. As a climax he exhibited several exquisite pieces of jewelry made in his own workshop.

Chaperons included faculty members and the wives or husbands of married teachers.

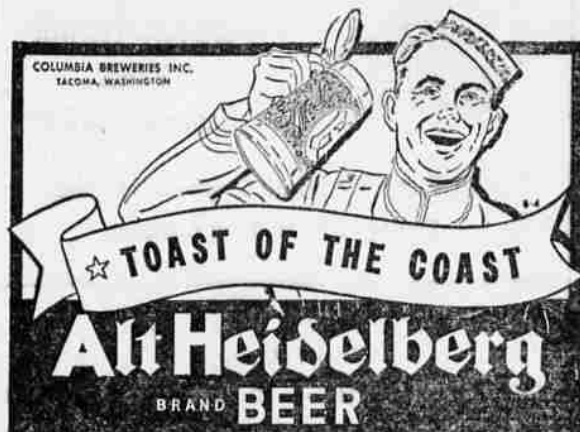

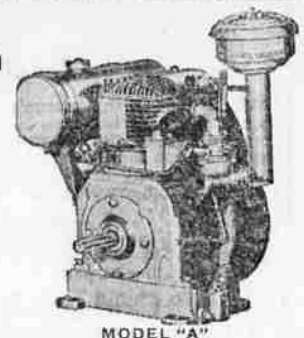

For the first and only time in history, eggs in all classifications, (shell, frozen and dried), showed a drop in storage holdings in the month of March. Over a five year average, egg storage increases about 2,600,000 cases in March. Last year, the increase was just average. But this year holdings dropped more than 200,000 cases. That means only one thing: eggs will be scarce next fall. And HIGH.

Same report shows turkey holdings shrunk about 15 million lbs. We have about half of last year's April 1st holdings, and nearly 20% below normal.
