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silently out with his lawyers. After the judge's decision, Lewis' attorneys made the usual routine motion to set aside the verdict. Goldsborough denied it.

Presumably, the union will carry the case to the Supreme Court as it did the 1946 one.

Goldsborough granted a request by the Justice Department that a hearing be held Wednesday at 7:00 a. m. on the government's request for a temporary injunction under the Taft-Hartley law. The present court order expires next Friday, April 23.

This simply means that the government wants to keep in effect a court order against a coal strike.

Lewis Called Strike
Goldsborough also decided that the 29-day mine shutdown was a strike called by Lewis.

He said that terms "dishonored" and "honored" were words used by Lewis as a code to start and end the walkout.

Goldsborough said a strike can be called without using the word "strike."

He declared: "If a nod or any wink or a code was used in place of a word 'strike,' it was just as much of a strike as though the word strike had been used."

The "miners walked out when told the agreement was dishonored," Goldsborough said.

"They came back when told the agreement was honored." "Now what else can that be except a code?" Goldsborough said.

"As long as a union is functioning as a union it must be held responsible for the mass action of its members."

He said that this is a new principle of law he was setting for the first time in court history.

Lewis' Letter Cited

Goldsborough can impose almost any punishment on Lewis and the union. The only limit, under supreme court rulings and precedents, is that it must be within "sound reason." That limit comes from the constitution's bar against "cruel and unusual" punishment.

Goldsborough said the controversy arose over questions concerning pensions to miners.

He said the United Mine Workers and Lewis wanted a pension of \$100 a month when the miners had reached a certain age.

Goldsborough said he thought that was a worthy objective and if it were the whole matter before the court it would receive very sympathetic attention. But he said that also before the court was the matter of whether or not Lewis and the United Mine Workers had refused to obey a lawful order of the court.

Goldsborough read Lewis' letter of February 2 to the operators saying a dispute existed over pensions.

He called "very significant" this sentence:

"The United Mine Workers therefore advises you as a signatory to the agreement that it reserves the right at will to take any independent action necessary to the enforcement of the contract."

PITTSBURGH, April 19.—(AP)—Local officials of the United Mine Workers received here with cautious silence today word that John L. Lewis had been found guilty of contempt of court.

A spokesman for one UMW local which was still idle commented:

"I don't know what will happen. We're not working yet and it looks as if we won't."

Thousands more soft coal miners had returned to work today without awaiting outcome of the contempt trial.

Work resumption was heavy in western Pennsylvania, where coal operators expected output would reach 90 per cent of normal.

Supreme Court Upholds Negroes' Voting Right
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primary was not required by law and was not an election.

The Circuit Court said a complete set of primary laws was in effect in South Carolina when the Supreme Court ruled in April, 1944, that the right to vote in a primary election held under state laws may not be denied on the ground of race or color. The Circuit Court added:

"Immediately following this decision the then governor of South Carolina convened the state legislature and recommended that it repeal all laws with relations to primaries with the avowed purpose of preventing voting by Negroes in the Democratic primaries."

"The Senate Appropriations committee (of which he is chairman) is prepared to act swiftly regarding air force defense or any other national security matters placed before us."

"I have always been an advocate of air policy as the key to any national defense program," he said.

Draft Decision First
Bridges called on the administration and defense department to tell Congress immediately what ever steps are necessary "toward an adequate, balanced, overall program."

"Throughout my service in the senate, I have urged the development and maintenance of a striking air force, adequate to meet any contingency. Since World War II ended and Communist Russia's expansion was accelerated, I have emphasized that the need for such an air force is completely urgent."

Bridges told reporters previously there is little chance the measure providing money for a 70-group air force will get a clearance signal from his committee this week. He said the armed services committee should decide first what to do with the draft-universal military training bill it is considering.

Morse Warns Negroes
Reynolds, who is New York State commissioner of correction, and A. Phillip Randolph, president of the AFL Brotherhood of Sleeping Car porters, told senators earlier that members of the Negro race would wage a sit-down strike against draft unless segregation is ended.

Senator Morse told them at that time a civil disobedience campaign such as they outlined would lead to charges of treason. Other senators joined Morse in advising them against such action.

Reynolds identified himself as a wartime army chaplain and a 1946 Republican candidate for the house in the 22nd New York district. He told house committee today:

"I was black before I was a Republican. I maintain that a slave cannot fight for freedom, and my party loyalty ends when human rights are in jeopardy."

Communist Defeat In Italian Election Looms
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preted as favoring anti-Communists.

Counting began immediately. The Senate vote is counted first, and early returns are expected late tonight. First returns on 574 seats in the chamber of deputies are due tomorrow.

The grim tug-of-war in Italy between Russia and the West, reflected in the bitter and often violent campaign in the past three

months, accounted for the heavy turnout.

The threat of violence which hung over the two-day voting never materialized. The government had 330,000 armed watchers on duty. Heavy police detachments guarded the streets. Radio-directed tanks, armored cars and jeeps patrolled the cities.

Hospital Patients Vote

Ambulances carried the sick and injured to voting places. Hospital patients set up polling booths for those who could not leave. Bishops, priests, monks and nuns voted in large numbers, spurred by the injunction of Pope Pius XII that failure to vote would be a mortal sin. The Vatican supported the Christian Democratic Party of Catholic Premier De Gasperi.

There were reports of irregularities, but these seemed to be minor. The right and left charged and counter-charged that ballots marked in advance were being handed to the voters.

The voters' decision was contained in 83,294 plain wooden ballot boxes. These votes were cast for a total of 6,591 candidates of eight major parties and 39 minor groups. The most reliable barometer of the Italians' choice between Communism and Western Democracy will be in the vote for the chamber of deputies.

Despite the significance of the voting, the Italians appeared calm. Confidence seemed to be reflected in a strengthening trend for the lira, now 600 to the U. S. dollar, or 20 points better than just before the election.

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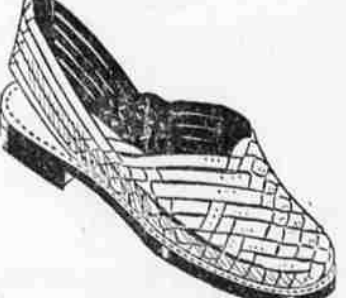
