Crater Lake Park Service Runs Out Of Stamp Money

MEDFORD, Ore.—(AP)—Brother, can you share a stamp? That's the cry of the Crater Lake National Park Service these days.

Caught between the economies of the administration and a skyrocketing amount of business the park is in the embarrassing position of being almost out of stamp money with a fair portion of the year yet to run.

The congressional appropriations committee cut the Park Service allowance for penalty (franked) postage about 40 per cent, explained Superintendent E. P. Leavitt.

Investigation brought out that it wasn't permissible to borrow money from some other fund and that there wasn't anything to do but make the remaining stamp allowance go around.

In the meantime, the Crater Lake Natural History Association, a non-profit organization, came to the rescue with a little loan for stamps, and the staff is doing out its stamp money the best possible way.
