Fisherman, Adrift, Saved After Ordeal of 26 Hours

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 22.—A British Columbia fisherman who clung helplessly to the mast of his slowly-sinking gill-netter for 26 hours, was rescued yesterday in Howe Sound 10 miles northwest of here. The fisherman, Patrick Kelly Stevenson, B. C., said three boats passed fairly close to him before

he was seen by the Canadian Pacific Steamer Princess Elaine. Only six feet of the mast was above water when he was rescued. The boat was swamped by heavy breakers, Kelly said.

Long, Umpqua, and two brothers, Roy Long, Roseburg, and Stanley Long, Umpqua. Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon, April 24, in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary at 2 p. m. The Rev. H. P. Sconce will conduct the service. Vault interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery.

The grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Fess of Roseburg, also survive.
