The largest of these is Tavannes, others are Pateck-Phillipe, Vacheron and Constantine, Melan, Omega and Ulysse Nardin. The 1170 that make most Swiss watches are assembly plants. These assemblers sell their watches to an importing company which in turn sells them with their brand name on the dial. Typical of these assembled watches are: Bulova, Croton, Helbros, Buren and Benrus as well as hundreds of others.

It is generally accepted that Ulysse-Nardin, Pateck-Phillipe, Vacheron and Constantine far exceed in quality any American made watch. Prices vary according to the degree of machining. For example, Pateck-Phillipe, considered one of the finest watches, start at \$300. This price is exclusive of diamonds or embellishments on the case; total value is in the movement. Many of these fine watches, when properly adjusted, are capable of time keeping rates within a few seconds per month.

Do not underestimate Swiss-made watches—but don't buy indiscriminately. Unless you have a comprehensive knowledge of watches buy from a jeweler whom you can trust. Whether you buy a Swiss or American made watch it is worth only as much as your jeweler's integrity. A watch is much like a person—its personality, character and physical stamina is individual—so select your jeweler with as much care and deliberation as you select your watch.
