Public School Rental To Churches Ruled O. K.

SALEM, Ore., April 26. — (UP) — Public schools can be rented to churches if all religious denominations are treated alike and if the church activities do not interfere with school sessions, Attorney General Neuner ruled today. Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, had asked Neuner if religious groups could rent schools for use on Saturdays and Sundays. Neuner also ruled that school boards have no authority to rent school buses to religious groups which want to use them outside of the school district.

Winchester Bay Will Expand Its Water System

REEDSPORT — Winchester Bay, four miles southwest of Reedsport, a fast-growing fishing and resort village, is contemplating entering into municipal water distribution on its own. At the present time, the town is supplied by the Reedsport Water Department. Recently residents there organized a rural fire district. The local water main system needs expansion, in order to properly protect the homes and business properties by installation of fire hydrants.

A committee of Bay residents and property owners have conceived the idea of forming a water district. They visited the Reedsport city council recently, with a proposition to purchase the water mains in the village which are now connected with the Reedsport main line from the Clear Lake water supply, to buy water wholesale from the City of Reedsport, and retail the water to the residents of Winchester Bay and the fire district.

They believe that it will be cheaper to extend their own lines, supply fire hydrants and other connections, than to rely on the City of Reedsport to do the work for them. Negotiations are now going forward to this end.

Swindler Must Pay Income Tax; Embezzler Doesn't

NEW ORLEANS — (UP) — A swindler must pay income tax on the proceeds of his scheme but an embezzler doesn't.

The U. S. fifth circuit court of appeals made the ruling when two Texans asked to recover taxes paid on \$272,200.

James A. Akers of Bexar county said he had embezzled the money from Mrs. Dora Roberts, wealthy 84-year-old widow. The government argued, and the court held, that he swindled it.

Differentiating embezzlement and swindle, the court said an embezzlement title to the money does not pass to the embezzler. Hence he does not have to pay income tax on it. In a swindle, however, the court said, title does pass to the swindler and tax must be paid.

Akers and his wife, Lela Akers, therefore are not entitled to recover any of the taxes Akers paid after he had been convicted of income tax evasion, the court decided.

Akers is immune, however, the

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court said from legal action in the swindle because of a Texas statute of limitation.

The swindle occurred, the court said, between 1932 and 1936 when Akers and a confederate obtained the money from the Howard county widow as "expenses" in a scheme to recover gold allegedly buried on the widow's ranch.

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
