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Banquet Scheduled By Lettermen of R. H. S.

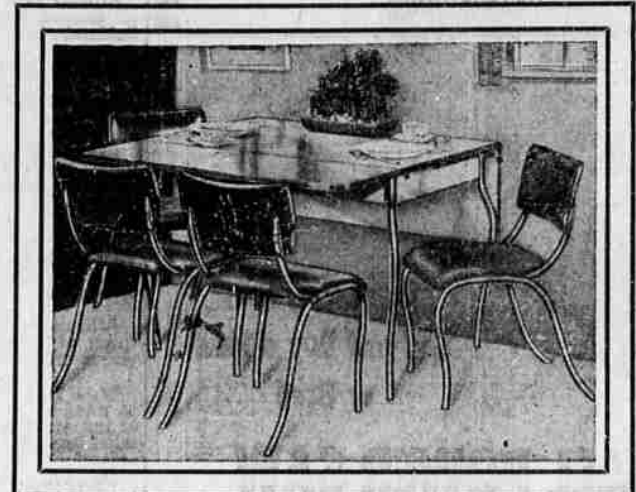
The R Club, lettermen's organization at Roseburg High School, will hold a banquet in the school gymnasium tonight at 6:30 o'clock.
