Stassen Wins Write-In Vote in Pennsylvania

Harold E. Stassen's surprise showing in Pennsylvania's write-in contest yesterday provided a new demonstration of his voter appeal.

As for Mr. Truman, Senator Hatch (D-N.M.) told a reporter he thinks it's all over but the shouting. "I don't believe anybody can stop the president from getting the nomination unless he, himself, should decide that he doesn't want it," the New Mexico senator said.

However, Senator Pepper (D-Fla.), who earlier had said he too considered Mr. Truman's nomination almost certain, caused some eyebrow-raising with a statement that he is "glad to see so many" delegate candidates in Florida backing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Florida names its delegates May 4. Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio put in a claim yesterday to 17 of Kentucky's 25 delegates chosen previously and left largely uninstructed. Rep. Clarence Brown (R-Ohio), his campaign manager, said Taft now is favored by 300 delegates. That matched the claim made earlier by Stassen, who is out to grab 23 of Ohio's 53 from Taft in next Tuesday's primary there. The score sheet still showed Dewey ahead in delegates publicly pledged or claimed without challenge.

Fendel Sutherland, Wife Visitors in Roseburg

Mr. and Mrs. Fendel Sutherland, Portland, were visitors in Roseburg over Tuesday night. They spent several hours in Sutherland, where the ashes of Mr. Sutherland's father, the late John R. Henry J. Loyens, 84, resident of this community for over 35 years, died April 27, after an illness of over two years. He was born in Holland and came to the United States at an early age. He was a resident of Olalla for numerous years. He was a member of the Catholic Church. Keith Harrison's Body En Route For Funeral Monday

The body of S/Sgt Keith Virgil Harrison, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Harrison, Umpqua Park road, will arrive in Roseburg Friday night on the 11:30 train under military escort. The body is being returned under the Government Repatriation program for the return of World War II dead.

Keith was born Jan. 21, 1923, in Roseburg. He received his schooling in the local schools and was graduated from the Roseburg high school. He entered the armed forces in August of 1933, receiving his training at Camp Adair, near Corvallis, with Co. "M", 27th Regiment, 70th Division. Wounded in the fighting at Forbach, Germany, he died in an Army hospital Feb. 28, 1945.

Surviving, besides the parents is a brother, Robert Harrison, of Roseburg. The American Legion will furnish an honorary guard from the train to the Long & Orr Mortuary. Funeral services will be held from the Methodist Church, Roseburg, Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Joseph Knotts, of the Methodist Church at Creswell formerly of Roseburg; the Rev. W. A. MacArthur, present minister of the Roseburg Methodist Church, and Dr. C. A. Edwards, retired Methodist minister, will officiate.
