In observance of the 25th anniversary of National Music Week, the Douglas County Music Teachers Association will sponsor a musical program at eight o'clock Friday, May 7th, at the Methodist Church.

The 25th annual observance will have for its keynote "Foster American Music." The annual Letter of Suggestions issued by the central committee from its headquarters in New York states that this keynote was the one used in the first synchronized nationwide observance in 1924 and that it was adopted again as an appropriate marking of the first

quarter century cycle.

Viewing in retrospect the country's musical progress during the last two and a half decades, C. M. Tremaine, secretary of the Music Week Committee summarized it as follows: "The United States has become a nation of music lovers, and is now generally recognized as such. What is equally gratifying is that there have been notable advances in the quality of the work of American composers and in the appreciation of American music. There has likewise been an increasing acceptance of American music in other countries."

All types of musical numbers have been planned for this annual program under the auspices of the Music Teachers Association. The public is cordially invited to attend. There will be no admission charge.
