National Forest Timber For Sale

Sealed bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, up to and not later than 2:00 p. m. June 1, 1948, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting, and all merchantable dead timber located on an area embracing about 70 acres within Section 4, T. 32 S., R. 1 W., W.M., Umpqua National Forest, Oregon, estimated to be 1,351,000 feet B. M., more or less, of Douglas-fir, 114,000 feet B.M., more or less, of sugar pine, 62,000 feet B.M., more or less, of ponderosa pine, 52,000 feet B.M., more or less, of white fir, 113,000 feet B.M., more or less, of California incense-cedar, and an unestimated amount of western hemlock and other species of saw timber. No bid of less than \$11.90 per M feet for Douglas-fir, \$21.50 per M feet for white fir, \$21.40 per M feet for sugar pine, \$24.40 per M feet for ponderosa pine, \$24.40 per M feet for California incense-cedar, \$21.50 per M feet for western hemlock and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage a cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M feet B.M., to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, a cooperative deposit of \$0.60 per M feet B.M., to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required. \$5,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Before bids are submitted, full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the Forest Supervisor, Roseburg, Oregon, or the District Ranger, Tillamook, Oregon.

Probability Of War Discounted By Kiwanis Speaker

Issuing a challenge to Kiwanians to help preserve the things we have, so that the rights and privileges we have enjoyed the last century and a half will never be destroyed, Harvey DeArmond, Bend, Kiwanis lieutenant governor of division 15, addressed the local club at the Tuesday noon luncheon.

The speaker painted the world situation as very dark indeed, and reviewed the steps leading up to the present situation, but expressed the opinion the United States would not be involved in war because:

1. He believes in the Marshall plan of feeding and clothing the people of Europe and offering them encouragement.
2. No power on earth is stronger than united opinion directed in a good cause.
3. The purpose of Kiwanians, as well as other organizations, is to unite in the belief that the privileges we now enjoy are not to be destroyed. Kiwanians, he said, can be a nucleus in the building of an active energetic force.
4. This country has come to the realization we must stiffen toward Russian aggression and are doing so.
5. Congress and the people are coming out of their state of complacency and will rebuild our forces so that no other nation will attack.
6. There will be no war as long as the United States has the only atom bomb.

DeArmond complimented the Roseburg club on its activities during the last year and urged a continued program of this nature. He reminded the members of the Kiwanians International convocation at Los Angeles June 6 and urged their attendance.

Another guest was E. E. Koford of Grants Pass, district chairman.
