When I visited England in 1944, I had the pleasure of a good visit with Lord Beaverbrook who publishes the London Daily Express. Millions Asked For Operation Of Higher Schools

CORVALLIS, April 29.—(AP)—Annual operating budgets for higher education totaling approximately a million dollars more than those of a year ago were adopted by the State Board of Higher Education meeting at Oregon State College this week.

The budgets are for the fiscal year starting July 1. Salary increases for all professional staff members on unrestricted funds were approved, aggregating approximately 12 1/2 per cent, except for those in the highest brackets, which were less. Staff members paid from restricted funds, such as federal co-operating extension will receive smaller pay raises now but administrators of such divisions were authorized to provide similar increases to the extent funds permit or recommend raises later if more money is obtained.

The board decided to seek a larger bond issue to finance the state college pavilion, construction bids for which were far above estimates when opened in Portland last week. Bids will be sought on a bond issue \$250,000 larger than the previous one, and the low bidder on the three construction contracts will be asked to extend the time when they may be accepted beyond the usual 30-days, if necessary.

Included under the emergency program for which funds will be sought is a state university hospital estimated at \$2,500,000. On the deferred "minimum need" list is completion of the hospital, nurses' residence, wing for school nursing and cafeteria, \$1,500,000. The board's building committee earmarked \$11,000,000 for projects, but said the work cannot be started until either the legislature or the people make the funds available.

Battle Faced To Keep Out Dread Poultry Disease

An additional 10 cases of the dread Newcastle disease of poultry have been encountered in Oregon since the first case was diagnosed in the poultry disease laboratory at Oregon State college in January 1947, declares Dr. E. M. Dickinson, veterinarian of the experiment station in charge of the laboratory.

Newcastle disease is now widespread along the Atlantic coast through the midwest and in California, while it affects turkeys as well as chickens, all the Oregon cases so far have been found in chicken flocks.

To keep Newcastle disease from becoming a widespread problem in Oregon will require close cooperation between all persons concerned with poultry production, Dr. Dickinson points out. He says chicks as well as grown birds are susceptible and may be carriers of the disease. Out-of-state purchases of birds are safe only after complete investigation of the source flock.

The disease is an acute, contagious respiratory ailment that is marked during the early stages by gasping and difficulty in feeding. This symptom is usually followed by lack of coordination, paralysis or tremor in the birds. It is not necessarily fatal. In brooder chicks, mortality usually

runs about 25 per cent. A sudden drop in egg production can be expected in laying flocks affected. Eggs laid during Newcastle outbreak may have higher percentage of soft or deformed shells.

Dr. Dickinson emphasizes that survivors of an attack of Newcastle disease, apparently recovered, may become "healthy carriers" of the infection. Thus, they endanger other susceptible birds. Wherever Newcastle disease is suspected in poultry flocks, Dr. Dickinson urges that county agents be contacted immediately. Then three or four birds with typical symptoms can be brought to the college veterinary laboratory for examination.
