

Stock Exchange Strike Settled

NEW YORK, April 29.—(AP)—Union employees today ended their month-long violence-punctuated strike against the New York Stock Exchange by accepting pay raises offered by the financial market.

A spokesman for the exchange said 100 of the union-estimated 950 strikers would not be taken back.

Meanwhile, the strike continued against four brokerage houses to which the walkout spread.

The union originally asked increases of \$9 for employees earning less than \$40 weekly and \$15 for those earning more. Later it scaled this down to \$6 and \$10.

The Stock Exchange offer accepted today provided \$3 weekly for those earning up to \$49, \$4 for those earning between \$50 and \$74 and \$5 weekly for those earning more than \$74.

Dewey's Itinerary in Oregon Partially Set

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will carry his fight for votes against Harold E. Stassen right up to the eve of the May 21 Oregon Republican primary election.

Paul E. Lockwood, the New York governor's secretary, who said only that no final appearance date for Dewey had been set. He has released the itinerary only through May 4. Dewey starts a tour of the state by bus Tuesday. His itinerary after that day has not been released, but the Journal said he would go to Eugene, Coos Bay, Medford, Klamath Falls and Bend after speaking Tuesday night at Corvallis. He then, the newspaper said, would fly to Spokane, Seattle and Walla Walla for May 9 and 10, and return to Oregon on Ontario May 11 to resume the campaign.

Boommens' Strike Hits Grays Harbor Area Hills

ABERDEEN, April 29.—(AP)—The Bay City Lumber company sawmill was closed today as the wide-spread strike of boommen and rafters began to be felt in Grays Harbor.

Manager Stuart Polson said the company's planing mill will be shut down Friday night.

In Hoquiam, E. C. Kaune, manager of the Polson Lumber company, said that company's sawmill also will close Friday. The planer mill, dry kiln and box factory will continue to operate, he said.

The Bay City operation affects 200 employees, the Olson mill 150.

Training School Youths No Criminals, Ruling

SALEM, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—Boys and girls committed to the state training schools cannot be classified as criminals. Attorney General Neuner ruled today for the State Board of Control.

Neuner ruled that the state training school for boys at Woodburn and the Hillcrest school for girls at Salem are not penal institutions, and that their function is to protect their inmates rather than to punish them. He said they are classified as delinquent or dependent children, instead of as criminals.

Snowfall Closes Logging Camps in Several Areas

Light snowfall in several areas of the county closed a number of logging operations Wednesday. The U. S. Weather Bureau here said the snow was not expected to last, although there might be more flurries of snow today.

Camps were reported closed in the Little River area, east of Roseburg; Calapooia, east of Sutherlin, and near Tyee, Olalla, Boomer Hill and Myrtle Creek.

Morse Predicts Changes in Taft-Hartley Law

URBANA, Ill., April 29.—(AP)—"An increasing number of members of Congress are hedging a

little on the Taft-Hartley law," Senator Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) told a University of Illinois audience last night.

Morse, a critic of the labor law, said that some members "are beginning to suggest that maybe it needs not some slight but some basic revision."

He predicted that it "will in due course of time be changed by the Congress."

H. Andersen (R-Minn.) to bar the sale of colored oleo altogether. Rep. Katharine St. George (R-N. H.) added a feminine touch. Oleo should be "virgin white," she said, adding: "If it's so perfect, why does it need another color?"

On the House roll call, 118 Republicans joined 140 Democrats and two American Laborites to put the bill through. Opposing were 92 Republicans and 14 Democrats.

But even if the Senate and President Truman approve the bill, many a housewife still won't be able to buy her margarine already colored.

It's against the law to sell colored oleo in these states:

California, Connecticut, Delaware, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Maine, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont, Washington, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

Others Add Taxes

Some other states impose special licenses or taxes on oleo.

The federal taxes which the bill passed Wednesday would repeal are:

Ten cents a pound on colored oleo; 1 1/2-cent a pound on uncolored; \$600 a year tax on manufacturers; \$450 on wholesalers of colored oleo; \$200 on wholesalers of the uncolored product; \$48 on retailers of colored oleo; \$6 on retailers of uncolored.

Egyptians, Arabs On Move Toward Palestine

reports said half or more of the Egyptian army was mobilizing or actually gathered near the border.

Regent Abdul Ilah of Iraq declared all "Arab" nations are "agreed to rescue Palestine" and that their regular armies would strike soon.

Besides Belaan, the Jews

claimed the occupation of Jordan valley. The Jordanian forces near Samakh, at the southern tip of the Sea of Galilee, Jisr Al Majami and the Teggart station near Gasher. They said yesterday Arabs from Trans-Jordan attacked Gasher, a Jewish community.

The real battle for Palestine was not yet developed but already 3,445 persons were officially counted dead since partition was decided upon by the United Nations last November.

LAKE SUCCESS, April 29.—(AP)—The Arabs today rejected a French proposal for an international volunteer police force for Jerusalem.

The Jews agreed to the proposal for a 1,000-man elite force to safeguard Jerusalem's holy places under a proposed truce, but the Arab rejection dashed hopes for its establishment.

Jamal Hussein, vice-chairman of the Arab Higher Committee for Palestine, told the United Nations trusteeship council the Arabs "object to foreign troops being sent to our country." He said the term troops also meant police.

Hussein added that the Arabs would not resist the proposed police force but would never agree to it.

The United States renewed its appeal meanwhile for quick U. N. approval of the American plan for U. N. trusteeship over Palestine.

foreign connections.

"But it would be a crime to continue attempting to establish a Communist totalitarian dictatorship, or to aid and abet such an attempt."

No Dictators Wanted

The bill says it is a matter of fact that an international Communist movement is conspiring to set up totalitarian dictatorships through organizations it controls in other countries.

Such organizations are defined to include the American Communist party.

And the bill says it shall be unlawful for any person to:

Attempt in any manner to set up a foreign-controlled totalitarian dictatorship in the United States.

Take part in any movement to create a dictatorship.

The crime could be punished by a maximum fine of \$10,000 and 10 years in jail. In addition, violators could be deprived of their American citizenship.

Through these provisions, Nixon said "we are attempting to crack the hard core of the Communist party leadership. In effect, they outlaw the Communist party as a secret, conspiratorial organization."

Police throughout Europe, with

the possible exception of Italy and Trieste, took a calm view of the coming celebrations. In prior years May Day has often led to sharp disorders.

650,000 (280,000) in the National Guard. The Regular Army would be organized into 12 divisions, plus 50 battalions of anti-aircraft defense.

A Navy of 556,000 regulars (350,000), 220,000 (166,000) organized reserves. They would man about 390 combatant ships, including about 16 carriers and 32 air groups.

This would be a peacetime force. Should the United States be attacked, the current thinking of the high command is understood to be along the line of a "Mobilization Day" force of these dimensions:

1. A Ground Army of 25 to 30 divisions, both regular and National Guard, fully equipped and trained, ready to move overseas immediately.

2. A Navy of 900 combatant ships.

3. An Air Force of 110 to 120 groups, not including Naval aviation.
