Traffic Deaths Drop In First Quarter of 1948

CHICAGO, April 30.—(AP)—The nation's traffic deaths in the first quarter of 1948 dropped to four-fifths of the immediate postwar level reached in the first quarter of 1946.

In announcing the figures today the National Safety Council attributed the drop to the most intensive and highly-organized accident prevention campaign in the nation's history.

The 6,480 traffic deaths the first three months of this year amounted to a seven per cent reduction from the 6,990 killed in corresponding 1947 period.

The council estimated traffic accidents in the first quarter of 1948 caused actual and potential production losses of \$320,000,000.

and began picketing in an effort to force the store to stop dealing with Bear Bros., Inc., a building contractor employing non-union carpenters on a job of renovating the store.

The picketing continued until stopped by a federal court order last February 14.

In reaching his conclusion, Linder quoted from a supreme court opinion of Justice Jackson saying that where violence or other-law violation occurs in picketing "the constitutional remedy would be to stop the evil, but permit the speech, if the two are separable; and only rarely and when they are inseparable to stop or punish the speech or publication."

Linder said it is his view that the picketing at the Montgomery store "was an integral part of

the strike, in support thereof, and not separable from the strike."

because coal operators say financing the pension payments Lewis desires would require 40 cents royalty.

May Demand More Pay
In addition to the pension issue and the royalty which supports it, there is speculation Lewis will ask for a substantial wage increase and other concessions such as more holidays and vacation.

At present the mine workers receive \$100 as a vacation payment.

The vacation time is scheduled this year for June 26 to July 4.

If the 400,000 soft coal diggers walk out June 26, Lewis can say they are on vacation—not on strike.

Lewis and the United Mine Workers are under a Taft-Hartley law injunction forbidding them to renew the six weeks walkout of this spring over the pension issue.

Judge T. Alan Goldsborough issued the injunction in U. S. District Court here after he fined Lewis \$20,000 and the union \$1,400,000 for ignoring an earlier court stop-strike order.

Most lawyers say this injunction would not stop a strike over a new contract.
