

Trout Season Open Saturday; Angling Regulations Given

Local anglers will be given a chance to test their skill with fly and rod Saturday, May 1, with the opening of trout fishing season, but because of the unusually wet weather, high water and generally muddy conditions the opening day is not expected to bring too many sizeable catches.

A number of fishing parties, however, will be out on the local streams.

The bag limit will be 10 fish but not to exceed 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 20 fish but not to exceed 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days and in possession at any one time; there is no bag limit for whitefish or Dolly Varden.

Six inches is the minimum length for trout, except in specified areas including the main Umpqua River below the forks and the stream system tributary to its floodwater portion, where the limit is eight inches. Diamond Lake length limit is 10 inches.

Boat fishing will be unlawful above the power dam in the North Umpqua River at Winchester, according to the official booklet on Oregon angling laws.

Closed Areas Listed

Special rules pertaining to Douglas County show the following areas closed to all angling: Lake Creek from a point where the creek empties out of Diamond Lake, downstream to a point where the highway bridge crosses the stream, and that part of Diamond Lake lying within a radius of 1,000 feet from the beginning of Lake Creek; Smith River above a point 400 feet below the falls; Lake Creek and its tributaries (inlet to Loon Lake) below the falls; South Umpqua River from a point 50 yards above to a point 150 yards below the South Umpqua Falls; all tributaries to North Ten Mile Lake; Rock Creek (tributary to North Umpqua) from the Rock Creek dam downstream to the lower boundary line of the Game Commission hatchery property; Fall Creek (tributary of Little River) and its tributaries; Little River, and its tributaries; Diamond Lake.

Also closed are: That part of North Umpqua River between Winchester Dam and highway bridge over North Umpqua River on Route 99; that part of Calapooia Creek, from the dam at Sutherlin water works downstream to the bridge crossing the road leading to Nonpareil, a distance of 800 feet; that part of the North Fork of Smith River and its tributaries above Reed Ranch; that part of Fish Lake lying east of a line beginning at a point 400 feet north of the mouth of High Rock Creek and extending to a point 400 feet west of the mouth of High Rock Creek; that part of Tahkenitch Creek, from a point one mile below the coast highway bridge downstream to the ocean; all tributaries of the North Umpqua below and including Steamboat Creek, except Rock Creek and Little River, and all tributaries of Little River.

Special trout season and bag limits are listed for Diamond Lake, Fish, Buckeye, Twin and Cliff Lakes and Fish Lake Creek, and for Marie, Twin and Eel Lakes.

Either the Chiefs or Merchants stand to place at the top of the standings, but a win for the Studs would also put them in the running.

Coach Doug Tait has not yet announced his starting lineup, but it is expected to be similar to that which worked so effectively last Sunday, with Lavon Baker, or possibly Roy Long starting in the pitching box, and Jerry Huggins behind the plate.

Lou Boudreau, batting .519 for his unbeaten Cleveland Indians, is a solid argument for the survival of the player-manager in the major baseball leagues.

Last of the big leaguers who still combine the two difficult jobs, Boudreau almost lost his portfolio last fall. Only a flood of mail from aroused Tribe fans induced owner Bill Veeck to call off a tentative trade with St. Louis.

Instead of a trade, Boudreau was signed to a "virtually a two-year contract," according to Veeck.

The "cares" of bossing the Indians to six straight wins have weighed so heavily on Lou that he has been able to hit safely only 14 times in 27 at bats. This is tops in the league. With nine runs batted in, he is tied for the lead. His shortstop work remains unchanged.

Boudreau pounded out four straight hits, including a double and home run, in yesterday's 5-2 victory over the St. Louis Browns. The team now needs only three more triumphs to tie the modern day record for wins at the start of the season.

Yanks Beat Senators
The New York Yankees got their Joe Dimaggio-Joe Page combination working for a 5-4 edge over Washington in 10 innings. The result moved the Yanks into second place, going into the important three-game series with the Red Sox at Boston today.

Homers by McGuinn, Keller and Berra weren't enough for the champs. They had to go an extra frame and finally won on

Dimaggio's long fly with the bases loaded and home out.

Page relieved Shea, who was in trouble again by giving seven walks. Left-handed Joe picked up his first win on four hitless innings.

Boston cut loose with a barrage of homers—one each by Williams, Mele, Dobson and Jones—to smother Philadelphia, 11-5, although they were outbatted by the A's.

Mayo's error on Kollotway's grounder enabled Chicago to pound Detroit, 5-4, for their second victory. Catcher Robinson had a perfect day for the Sox with three hits, including a homer and double.

Rookie Sauer enjoyed a field day in Cincinnati's 14-inning 5-4 rout over St. Louis. Sauer tied the score with a homer in the eighth and won it in the 14th with a single. He had four hits, boosting his average to .364.

Homers by Sisler and Walker enabled the Phillies to edge the Boston Braves, 4-2.
