The San Francisco Seals led the way. They retained their 13 game margin by beating San Diego, 2-1, last night and Los Angeles kept its second spot by edging Sacramento, 3-4, in 12 innings.

The Oakland Oaks strengthened their hold on third position by strapping Seattle twice, 4-3 and 7-5, moving within a half game of Los Angeles.

But the rest of the league is strung out from five to eight games behind the leaders.

Portland succeeded in ending a seven-game losing streak, beating Hollywood, 3-2, in the first game of a doubleheader, but the Stars took the nightcap, 6-5.

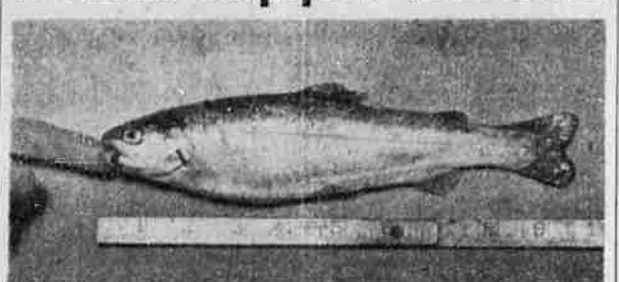
Oakland and Seattle were tied 3-3 in seven innings, supposed to be the length of their first game, and Seattle pitcher Gorman handed the game to the Oaks in the eighth when he balked with the bases loaded, forcing in a run.

The PCL midnight curfew ended the second game after seven innings. Seattle was leading 5-3 going into the last of the seventh when Oakland exploded for four runs and the ball game.

Portland's pitcher Liska won his 19th PCL game in beating Hollywood, putting him close to Seattle's Barret, who has 202 league wins. Liska allowed six hits, also singling and scoring a run. Anglers Requested to Report Taking of Tagged Fish Freed In North Umpqua, Little River

Last February, approximately 122,000 rainbow trout were liberated from the Rock Creek hatchery into streams throughout the Umpqua River watershed. Included in the release were 269 tagged fish whose movements the State Game Commission is "anxious" to trace. It was reported by H. P. Newcomb, Umpqua River biologist.

The marked fish were released in the North Umpqua and Little River. The specimens were marked with two kinds of tags: A circular jaw tag and a flat, strap tag which was placed in two locations—the operculum (gill cover) and at the rear edge of the dorsal (back) fin. In the accompanying photo, the dorsal tag does not show.

It is anticipated, Newcomb said, that the strap tags may not remain in place and anglers are urged to examine their catches for evidence of mutilated gill covers or dorsal fins from which the tags may have been torn loose.

All sportsmen are requested to report tagged fish or those thought to have lost tags to the Game Commission Field Agent, P. O. Box 451, Roseburg, or call 767.

Catch Doug Talit is expected to start either LaVon Baker, Roy Long, or Wallace Richardson in the pitching box, with Baker likely slated for the nod, following his performance last Sunday.

Jerry Huggins will again be behind the plate. Ward Cummings is expected to get the first base call, with either Bert Avery or Virgil Sanders on short; Lovell Baker on third and Bill Shapiro on short.

Ralph Montgomery in right field; Del Hoff, center and Elmore Hill in left field are probable starters, although the lineup will be subject to change.

Other Sunday games will see Central Point playing at Tri-City; Central Point Stars at Crescent City, Calif.; Medford at Ashland, and Klamath Falls at Grants Pass Old Timers.

Cottage Grove High Tops Track Meet; Roseburg Fourth

EUGENE, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—Seven records were established here yesterday as Cottage Grove High School ran away with the Tri-City League track title.

The best of the marks was John Schneider's 143 foot 11 inch discus throw for Newport High. Schneider also set a shot put record of 42 feet 34 inches, and won the javelin event.

Cottage Grove scored 971 points in besting the ten-team field. Newport scored 38, Lebanon 34, Roseburg 22, University (Eugene) 17 and Sweet Home 1.

Roseburg was without the services of Art Backlund, who placed first in the mile and half-mile in the Greater Willamette Valley meet the preceding Friday. Bob Scott, Javelin hurler, and Don Hubbard, high hurdler, all three of whom left yesterday with Coach Jack Newby to participate in the 20-30 invitational meet at Klamath Falls.

Citizenship Of 2,300 Ex-Interned Japs Reinstated

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—(AP)—A federal judge has reinstated the U. S. citizenship of 2,300 war-interned Japanese and criticized the government for accepting their renunciations.

District Judge Louis E. Goodman ruled for the Japanese, who said their renunciation was obtained under duress from other nationalist-minded Japanese residents of the Tule Lake, Calif., camp in 1945.

The Japanese, through their attorney and the Civil Liberties Union, brought the action against Attorney General Tom Clark to be reinstated.

Judge Goodman's opinion stated: "If a confession secured in a manner obnoxious to congressional policy may not be used in a criminal case, it is equally true that a document releasing the priceless insignia of American citizenship should not be validated when executed in a like manner."

Authority for internment of American-born Japanese at the outset of the war came under Goodman's fire.

In view of the admissions contained in affidavits in this case," he said, "I have no doubt that there was a complete lack of constitutional authority for administrative, executive or military officers to detain and imprison American citizens not criminally charged or subject to martial law."

Planes Alone Not Ample for Defense, Army Chief Says

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—Senator Guy Cordon said yesterday that the assumption is that if war should come the enemy would try to knock out America's industrial might by air attack.

At a Senate appropriations committee hearing, Cordon asked Secretary of the Army Royall whether a 70-group air force would be justified on that basis.

Royall replied that we "can't rely solely on aircraft" to prevent such an attack. He said we would have to have plenty of anti-aircraft and other ground force equipment.

"The only way to prevent an attack (on the United States) is to hold (outlying) bases," Royall said. He mentioned Alaska, Newfoundland, Iceland and the Azores.

In reply to a question by Senator Knowland, Royall said an enemy would not necessarily need a sea fleet to capture or hold these bases. He said it could be done by air through a "hopping procedure."

"Nor would they need a fleet, if they captured those bases, to hop more places," he said.

An appeal for approval of the 70-group air force program was made to the subcommittee by Rep. Hinshaw, vice chairman of the congressional aviation policy board.

Urging fast action, Hinshaw said a three-year time lag between authorization and aircraft
