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Don Forbes Gets District J. C. Post

PORTLAND, May 3 (UP)—John Sandmeyer, Klamath Falls, was elected president of the Oregon Junior Chamber of Commerce at closing sessions of the state convention here Saturday.

The organization named Baker as site for the 1949 convention, Salem for the September meeting and Bend for the spring meeting next February.

Frank Merrill, Albany, retiring president, and Bruce Kelly, Portland, were elected national directors. New District vice presidents are: 1—Duane Duke, Oregon City; 2—Bob Upson, Albany; 3—Don Forbes, Roseburg; 4—Dr. James Dreher, Prineville; 5—Carl Davis, Baker.

Sandmeyer appointed James Stillwell, Klamath Falls, secretary-treasurer.

The junior chamber delegates went on record as unanimously in favor of daylight saving time on a state-wide basis.

A resolution favoring outlawing the Communist party, originated by the Birmingham, Ala., junior chamber of commerce, was voted down by the Oregon convention.

The state Jaycees went on record in favor of each local chapter helping at least one fund-raising agency for foreign relief. In addition, the delegates voted to recommend to the national junior chamber of commerce that nine junior chamber of commerce men from as many different professions be sent through Western Europe as an investigating committee to determine conditions and make recommendations to the national junior chamber on progress of the European recovery program.

were present. The meeting adjourned to the City Hall, where a lunch was served by the Ladies Auxiliary.

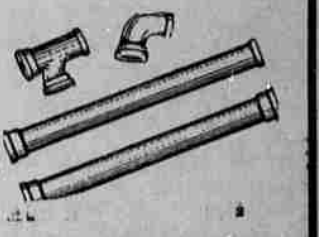

High Priced Feed.

Can cheap feed be high-priced? It certainly can. You might even get a perfectly balanced, vitamin potent, mineral protected feed like UMPQUA FEEDS, and get it at a very low price, compared to other feeds of equal quality in this part of the world; and still feed such a HIGH-PRICED FEED that you couldn't possibly come out with a profit.

This sounds screwy, right off the bat, but let us explain. No matter how much or how little feed costs you, it is high-priced when you feed only enough for body maintenance. There is seldom a set of conditions which will justify feeding a maintenance ration.

Here's how it figures out. If a well-savvy pig gets just enough feed to keep him alive, you can continue feeding that amount for a year, and you still have just the same amount of pig. You have nothing to show for the feed that pig consumed for a year. That was high-priced feed.

But suppose you fed another pig, just like our first little friend, all the feed you could get him to eat. At six months of age, he would be a hog, and you could cash in for about \$25.50 a hundred on the hoof. The feed may have cost a heap, but if it was UMPQUA PIG RATION, the hog would have paid for it, besides leaving you a few dollars for your trouble and headwork.

Pays to Stay Home

You've heard of Newcastle Disease in poultry? Yes, you must have because it has been widely publicized lately. We even thought too much so for awhile. But we changed our minds.

Several new cases have been diagnosed in the State, and we know of three in Douglas County. There may be others unreported, though we sincerely hope not. All cases in Douglas County were IMPORTED. We think all cases in Oregon were picked up through imported stock. We have every reason to believe that at least two cases in Douglas County were contracted in the express car on our Midnite Rattler as it rolled over the Oregon prairies at three miles an hour. The other case we know of was shipped in from a midwestern state.

Suppose all the chicks in Douglas County had been bought right here at home. We would still have no Newcastle Disease. The cheap chicks from some far distant place will prove more costly in the end.

The same principle applies to FEED. When you can get good chicks, good poultry and GOOD UMPQUA FEEDS at home, why take chances on going outside, and building up some other community. There are many, many good reasons for trading at home. For one, your home business man is your personal friend.
