Welfare Expense Of Douglas Shown

Douglas County budgeted \$93,300 in property taxes for 1947-48 welfare purposes; for the last five years \$421,338 was budgeted by the county, and since 1933 \$151,384,586 of federal, state (liquor profits) and county property tax funds were spent on all welfare purposes in Oregon, according to Oregon Business & Tax Research, the state taxpayer organization.

All Oregon counties budgeted \$3,762,389 of welfare property taxes this fiscal year. This total may not coincide with actual expenditures, it was pointed out.

Total welfare costs for past 14 years, using Public Welfare Commission data, were 29 per cent of the \$437,723,510 state highway expenditures, in the 34-year period, 1913 to 1947.

Douglas County levied 2.2 mills property tax, 1947-48, for welfare costs, which millage levy was \$4.2 per cent of the county's total levy for all purposes, excluding roads.
