Cardinals Down Dodgers, Move Up To 3rd Spot in Race

The St. Louis Cardinals last night defeated the Brooklyn Dodgers in St. Louis, 5-4, and took undisputed possession of third place, a full game ahead of the fourth place Dodgers, in the National League game yesterday.

That was the only National League game yesterday. The hustling Philadelphia Athletics gained ground on the American League leading Cleveland Indians when they nipped the Tribe 8-6, in 10 innings at Philadelphia. Each team has won three more games than it has lost, but the Indians lead by 52 percentage points, having played fewer games.

The New York Yankees moved up to third place, within a half game of the leaders, by thrashing the St. Louis Browns 6-1. The Boston Red Sox registered their third successive victory as they pasted the Detroit Tigers, 6-3.

In the American League's only night game, the Chicago White Sox scored two runs in the top of the fifth inning to tie the Senators in Washington, 3-3. Rain ended the game at the end of the fifth.

Rehabilitation Work To Be Shown at Vets Hospital

headed by Dr. Arthur S. Anderson, proper treatments using water, heat, light or electric current, and corrective therapy for patients with deformities.

Shock treatments were started at Roseburg four years ago. Given only with consent, shock helps about 40 per cent of those treated, it was found by Dr. Leo Crowley, who directed this work until his recent transfer to Montana. Some recoveries through electrical shock appear miraculous, however.

Hydrotherapy—water applied at exactly prescribed temperatures and pressures—benefits more of the "deeply disturbed" than anything else.

Education Included
Improvement of education restores self-confidence and better the chances of patients for returning to their communities. Reading, writing and high school subjects are given, and all the armed forces textbooks are available in a take-out library. Typing and shorthand are being taught now by volunteer workers.

In the manual arts department, Roseburg patients take wood-working, metal work, shoe-repairing, weaving, sewing, painting (from furniture to oils), beadwork and leather-tooling. A brand-new darkroom, fully equipped, offers photography.

Outdoors, the 453 acres in the hospital grounds afford ample land for agricultural interests. World War I patients—in the majority—show particular interest in the soil. About 25 acres are put into truck gardens, eight acres are in orchard and nearly 150 acres in field crops. In various stages of weight-gaining are between 200 and 300 porkers.

Patients are never forced to take part in any of these activities. Studies, work, handicrafts and hobbies are encouraged to attract them back to normal pursuits. Last January, out of 557 patients there were 334 who took part in this rehabilitation program.

Normal Life Duplicated
Community life is duplicated as closely as possible in its social aspects, also, and the volunteer efforts of veterans', fraternal and civic organizations are making this successful.

Groups from Eugene, Roseburg,

Medford, Grants Pass and Coos Bay, and musicians and actors from the University of Oregon and Oregon State College, have put on a busy series of stage shows, dances, parties and musical programs.

The VA itself runs a motion picture circuit in all its hospitals, showing films at the same time or even ahead of general distribution. Ten camp shows, successors to the USO shows, are now touring NP and the more isolated veterans' hospitals.

Recreation and Library

Close to 65 per cent of the patients take part in sports, ranging from billiards and table tennis to softball, basketball and touch football. Others join in sports guessing contests or trips to nearby games.

In the library, with its 3,600 volumes, patients prefer westerns, but generally read magazines and newspapers and non-fiction works, rather than fiction. Patients put out a bi-weekly mimeographed paper of their own.

Besides these functions, which are particularly important to neuropsychiatric care, the Roseburg hospital maintains medical and dental services, and an emergency medical ward for veterans of southern Oregon.

National Hospital Day is a good time to remind the public that one of the biggest obstacles to complete recovery of mental patients is its misconception of mental disease. When a veteran returns home from the hospital he needs, more than anything else, the friendliness and natural relationships and opportunities which only his neighbors can give him.

A visit to the Roseburg hospital next Sunday may help to dispel some of the "Dark Age" thinking which is directed toward our mental institutions and which handicaps the recovered patient when he returns to his home.

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expressed belief that the needs can best be met by a modern, fire-proof building.

In answer to questions from the floor, it was revealed that the lumber industry, upon which the city of Roseburg is largely dependent, is the second most hazardous of occupations, just below coal mining. This increases the hospital need.

Furthermore, more people are seeking hospital and doctor's care. Various hospital plans add to this demand for additional facilities, said Dr. Hanford.

He stated that federal matching funds amounting to one-third of the amount needed are available, and that Roseburg would come under class B, which includes communities which have hospital facilities but which are inadequate for the growing needs of the area. Class A is for communities without hospital accommodations. The federal government requires that one-third of the local funds be raised and that the source of another third be secured.

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three miles east of Big Camas Ranger Station and parallel the main North Umpqua road at a distance of about 200 yards to the south.

Ultimately For Public Use

The desert is a high plateau and is comparatively level, requiring only minor grading. Forest service crews will start clearing and burning brush as soon as weather permits in preparation for grading and surfacing the 3,000-foot runway. The strip will be 200 feet in width.

It is anticipated that the field will be made available for public use following completion of the Toketee Falls project.

As an aid to aviation in the Umpqua Forest, Nelson reports, plans are being made to install directional and navigational markers on a number of forest service

ice lookout stations. These standard markers will show latitude and longitude and will point to airways and landing fields.

The area between the Willamette highway to the north of the Umpqua Forest, and the Medford-Crater Lake highway on the south is the worst "blind spot" along the entire Pacific Coast, Nelson said he is informed by
