Oregon State College men and women are making plans to entertain their mothers at the 25th annual Mother's Weekend on the campus May 7, 8 and 9, and have mailed to each mother a "Mother's Weekend Newsletter" and an invitation program listing the events for the three days.

Mrs. Kate W. Jamison, Dean of Women Emerita and originator of Women's weekend 25 years ago, will be honored during the weekend festivities.

The main event of the weekend will be the Associated Women Students Honor Convocation held Saturday, 1:30 p. m. in the Men's Gymnasium, where awards will be made to outstanding women students. Plans have been made to include men students in this year's convocation program. Mrs. James T. Brand, prominent Oregon civic leader, and the wife of James T. Brand, Associate Justice of the Oregon Supreme Court, will be the guest speaker.

"State of the Union," Pulitzer prize winning play, will be presented by the students of Oregon State College on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, 8:15 p. m., at the Majestic theater in downtown Corvallis.

"Salute to Rhythm of 1948" will be presented by 70 students of modern dance under the direction of Miss Betty Lynd Thompson Friday and Saturday nights at 8:15 p. m. in the men's gymnasium. The college symphony orchestra under the direction of Delbert Moore will accompany the dancers. Six of the girls in the dance and Miss Thompson recently made a tour to Washington and British Columbia, dancing before large audiences at several universities and high schools.
