City Property Loss From Fire During April Low

Roseburg suffered \$2,010 property loss from fire during the month of April, Fire Chief Glenn H. Taylor reported. City firemen answered seven alarms in the city. Total value of property at risk by fire was \$127,000.

In the rural fire district, firemen answered five alarms. Property at risk by fire was valued at \$3,000 with loss placed at \$1,410.

The Fire Department responded to a call from Kennedy's Dutch Mill April 3 to fight a cabin fire, and April 26 a roof fire at Winchester. The city charged \$25 for its services at both fires, since they were located outside the rural district.

Girl Admits She Slewed Father For Sexual Assault

WHEATON, Ill., May 6.—(P)—Alan Myers, chief investigator for the Dupage County State's Attorney's Office, said a 16-year-old girl related yesterday she slew her father after he raped her.

Myers said an oral statement was made by Frances Korbek, pretty high school student. The body of her father, William, 42, a CIO union official, was found Monday. He had been missing almost four months.

Korbek was president of a local of the United Steelworkers

Union. His wife, Frances, 40, and a younger daughter, Dorothy, 15, found the body hidden under a lumber pile in the basement of their home in Tri-State village, 11 miles south of Hinsdale, a Chicago suburb.

He had been shot through the head.

Myers said Miss Korbek told this story:

Her father came home intoxicated Jan. 9 and raped her while her mother and sister slept in a room at the rear of the house. Later, when her father had gone to bed, she obtained his .22 caliber rifle and fired several shots into his head. After making sure he was dead she dragged him from the bed to a trap door leading to the basement.

She pushed the body through the door and it tumbled into the

basement. Then she dragged it to a corner and hid it under a pile of lumber.

TOT DROWNS IN CANAL

ECHO, Ore., May 5.—(P)—Five-year-old Charles Parks drowned in an irrigation canal here Tuesday.

The child's body was recovered several miles north of Echo about two hours after he was missed by his mother. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Parks, moved here recently from Vale. They have two other children.

About 21 per cent of American homes which were wired for electricity had vacuum cleaners in 1925 and about 51 per cent had them in 1942.

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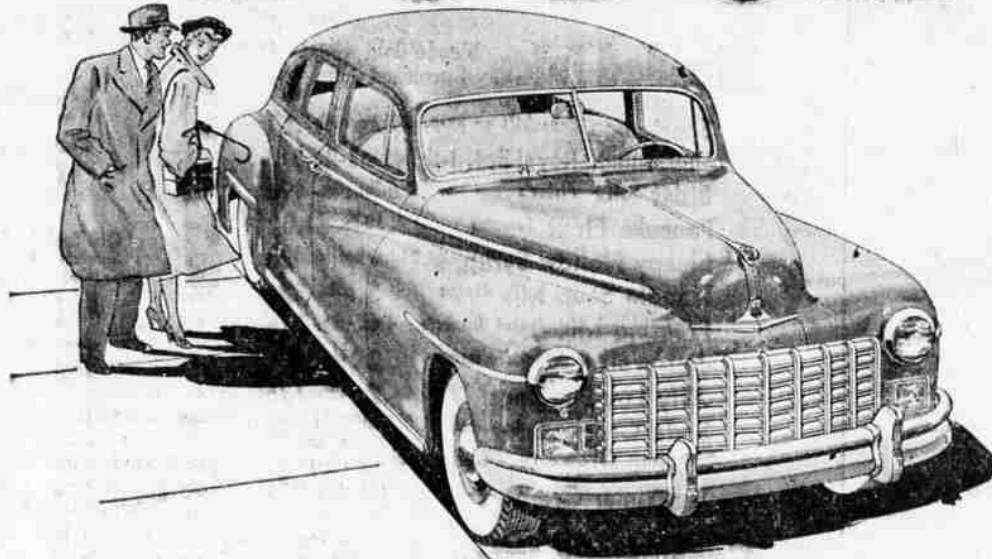
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
