Tuberculosis Hospital Head Speaker Here

Dr. Bellinger Stresses Need of Community Aid in Battling Disease

Members of the Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association, at their annual luncheon meeting Wednesday noon in the Umpqua Hotel, heard Dr. G. C. Bellinger, superintendent of the Oregon State Tuberculosis Hospital, speak on "Community Health," and re-elected all former officers as the principal business.

Dr. Bellinger revealed that while the tuberculosis death rate is generally on the downward trend, the death rate for children under five years of age shows a slight increase over that of 10 years ago.

Whether this increase is because "we are getting careless of certain fundamental principles" or a lack of health education he was not prepared to say, but he emphasized the seriousness of the situation and said that each community should know the fundamental cause of tuberculosis.

Dr. Bellinger pointed out the essential role of the community in stamping out tuberculosis, but added that a community health organization should represent a center of authority on various diseases injurious to mankind. Cancer, he said, may seem a long way from tuberculosis, but its prevention, too, should be considered as part of a basic community plan.

The speaker outlined conditions in which many persons are known to have had tuberculosis for many years but suffered no ill effects. But usually their health will break down in time without proper care, he pointed out.

He did not advocate that such persons be sent to a sanitarium but he did emphasize the importance of diagnosis in determining proper treatment, sanitary measures, and nutrition to aid the afflicted person and to prevent spread of the disease.

He also pointed out the necessity for the state hospital to discharge patients as soon as it is possible for them to become useful and safe citizens, but here, he said, is where the community must come in to take the respon-

sibility of accepting such patients. In answer to a question, he stated that nutrition played a large part in the cure of tuberculosis. Proper nutrition may save as many as one third of the persons whose health would normally break down.

He said that state laws are entirely adequate to control isolation of patients, by placing them in a sanitarium or by removing their families. But, he added, the enforcement is up to the district attorney, and it devolves on each community to have a thorough understanding with the district attorney to bring about the fullest cooperation.

There is at present a long waiting list at the state hospital of patients seeking admittance, but a building program is under way which will include expansion of present facilities and the construction of a new hospital to be ready in about two years. In the meantime, he said, it is necessary to discriminate among the most serious cases, and to turn back chronic cases, where the individual is not especially ill, to the communities from whence they come. He stated it is the duty of the sanitarium to take every case it can, but the duty also of the community to take back every case it possibly can.

He stressed the importance of mothers taking tuberculin and x-ray tests to eliminate many child fatalities, and the importance of removing from the home all active cases of tuberculosis.

He said that the use of the tuberculin test among school children was very valuable, and that it eliminated the necessity of x-rays in many instances. All positive reactions should be followed by x-ray examinations.

The officers re-elected included: Mrs. A. Watzig, Roseburg, president; Mrs. O. L. Torrey, Sutherlin, first vice-president; Mrs. Fritz Snyder, Days Creek, third vice-president; Mrs. Hugh Whipple, Drain, fourth vice-president; Mrs. Wallace Ferguson, Roseburg, secretary; and Mrs. Ray Peterson, Roseburg, treasurer.

Mrs. Watzig presided at the meeting. The invocation was given by Edmund Hyland. Mrs. Bellinger, wife of the speaker, was introduced as a guest. Mrs. Mary Barrett was chairman of the nominating committee. Decorations were provided by Mrs. Torrey and Mrs. Ferguson.

A motion to formally change the name of the county unit from Douglas County Health Association to Douglas County Tuberculosis and Health Association was adopted.

Approximately 30 persons from various sections of Douglas County were in attendance.

Unions to Counter Boeing Suit With One of Their Own

SEATTLE, May 6. (AP)—The Boeing Airplane Co. and the striking 14,500 members of the Aeronautical Maintenance Union fought with a multi-million dollar suit and the threat of a counter suit today in the two-week tieup of heavy bomber production.

The company filed a Federal Court action yesterday for \$2,250,000 damages from the union under the Taft-Hartley act. The complaint served notice the claims would increase as the strike continues to halt output of B-50 bombers and other aircraft. The union announced it was preparing a suit asking \$163,000 for every day of the strike for loss of wages and \$14,000 weekly to repay strike benefits to its parent organization, the International Association of Machinists.

With other actions contemplated, the total sought would run to \$5,000,000 at this date, a spokesman said. Money may also be asked to cover the cost of picketing, care for workers' welfare and other strike maintenance outlay, said Union Attorney L. Presley Gill.

Another contemplated action would demand that the company bargain with the union. The company suit, also directed against the IAM, accused the local and the IAM of "causing and sanctioning" the strike in violation of a non-strike clause in the contract.

Stassen's Picture Fails to Distract Dewey in Address

EUGENE, Ore., May 6. (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey experienced his first taste of the excitement in Oregon for his opponent, Harold E. Stassen, at the University of Oregon here last night.

As the New Yorker launched into his foreign affairs topic, five undergraduates sat ostentatiously in the front row, heads bent behind opened magazines flaunting on the cover a large portrait of the Minnesotan.

Dewey ignored them until a companion on the front row—not one of their number—rose to ask if the governor could "suggest a more practical method" of using foreign aid funds to insure world peace.

"That's what I have been talking about for 30 minutes," Dewey retorted, smiling. "But you were too busy reading. I'll explain it to you."

After the roar of laughter subsided, Dewey patiently sketched in the high points. What the governor was not aware of, however, was that his questioner was not a "reader."

The youth, David K. Simpson, 21, Salem, Ore., a sophomore at Northwest Christian College and an ex-GI, told reporters afterward he had "no hard feelings" over the incident.

R. H. S. Athletes Slated for Track Meet at Eugene

Track Coach Jack Newby will take 11 Roseburg High School boys and possibly alternates for some events to Eugene Friday to participate in the district track meet. Winners in this event will be entered in the state meet in Corvallis May 14 and 15. First and second place men will be invited.

Roseburg's strongest bid will come from Art Backlund, who has been running away from the field in the mile and half-mile events in all meets to date. Dick Stritzke or Neil Sheets will also be entered in these events. Two men may qualify.

Others who will enter the meet are Don Hubbard, high hurdler; Ivan Parkhurst and Bob Kruse, 440-yard dash; Sidney Smith, shot put; Jack Mathis, discus; Bob Sconce and Rogers or Rutter, javelin.

Scheduled for Saturday at 2 p. m. on Finlay field will be a track meet between Roseburg students from the seventh, eighth and ninth grades of the Junior High and sophomores of the Senior High against students from similar grades from Cottage Grove.

Broadcast Series To Stress American Ideals

The first of a series of six programs, dramatically reconstructing the "Foundations of Our American Ideals," will be heard Sunday, May 16, over radio station KRNR. The programs are a presentation of the Supreme Council, Knights of Columbus, and are sponsored in this area by Roseburg Council No. 2883.

Into the six 15-minute sketches have been packed the high spots of man's centuries-long struggle to win and hold the freedom so many Americans take for granted.

"The writing of the greatest charter for freedom and the founding of the American Republic came about only after 2,000 years of slow and frequently interrupted progress," said Grand Knight R. B. Wandling of the Roseburg council, who arranged for the broadcast.

"We are presenting these radio programs," he continued, "in the hope they may contribute to an increased vigilance against the parasites who fatten in the protection of freedom while they gnaw at the foundations of the American way."

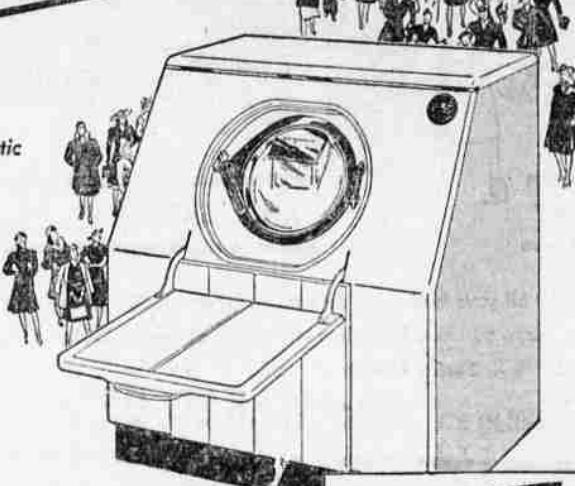
