Boeing Co. Still Refuses to Deal With Strikers

SEATTLE, May 7 — (AP) — The personal intervention of U. S. conciliator Cyrus S. Chang apparently had failed today to sway the Boeing Airplane Company from its refusal to negotiate with present representatives of its 14,300 striking employees.

William M. Allen, president of Boeing, wired Chang last night that "we must respectfully decline" to attend proposed joint meetings in Washington Monday with the International Association of Machinists and the conciliation service if the purpose of the meetings is "to bring the parties into collective bargaining negotiations."

Allen said, however, that if Chang wanted it, the company would send three representatives to the meeting "for the purpose of giving those present complete facts in support of our position that the strike is illegal."

No reference was made by Allen to the Aeronautical Mechanical Union, an affiliate of the IAM, which represents the workers on strike.

Allen declared in his telegram to Chang that the strike by the AMU violated existing contract. He said that under the National Labor Relations Act, an illegal strike removes the collective bargaining rights of those engaged in the strike.

"Your attention is called to the fact," he told Chang, "that this issue is now pending before the National Labor Relations Board."

Meanwhile, a committee named by Mayor William F. Devin reported today it was unable to find a basis for resumption of negotiations between the company and the striking union. The committee was named last week to explore possibilities of ending the strike.

No GOP Aspirant Thus Far Close To Nomination

WASHINGTON, May 6 — (AP) — With 770 delegates named to the Republican National Convention, none of the 10 men who thus far have first-ballot support is even close to the 548 needed for presidential nomination.

Here is the way they line up, with total delegates pledged, followed by distribution by states, crediting Stassen with nine and Taft with 44 in Ohio, the preliminary indication:

Many of the uncommitted delegates are claimed by Taft, Dewey and Stassen, but the claims overlap.

Federal Rules Set For Prospecting On O. & C. Lands

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The free and easy life of the prospector on public lands may be on the way out.

The Bureau of Land Management has set filing regulations for the exploration and development of mineral deposits in more than 2,500,000 acres of public land in western Oregon.

Bureau director Marion Clawson said in a statement the regulations "could set the pattern for a nationwide system of recording federal mining claims."

Heretofore prospectors were free to dig around on public lands for minerals without a federal permit, Clawson said. Only when the prospector actually started producing from his claim did he have to file with the federal government.

"As a consequence," said Clawson, "thousands of claims to mineral deposits on the public lands are recorded only in county recording offices."

"The federal government normally has no knowledge of explorations or development of the mineral deposits on its lands until actual production results in an application for a patent to the land, under mining laws dating back to 1866."

The new regulations, carrying out provisions of a law passed by Congress last month, extend the operations of the federal mining statutes to tracts of reversioned railroad grant lands and reconveyed Coos Bay Wagon Road grant lands in 18 counties of Oregon.

These areas were set aside by Congress in 1937, for administration in a special program for sustained yield from forests. Between 1937 and enactment of the new law, no authority existed for carrying on mineral development work in the area.

Mining claims on the tracts now must be recorded at the

Roseburg or Lakeview, Ore., district offices.

Clawson said the law despite its limited local area of application could set a pattern for nationwide recording of public-land mining claims.
