

Health Assn. Gives Report on Finances, Lists Activities

The financial report of the Douglas County Health and Tuberculosis Association, submitted by Kathryn A. Petrequin, treasurer, at the annual meeting here Wednesday, revealed a bank balance of \$7,107.17 with bonds and reserves amounting to \$518, as of March 31, 1948.

The bank balance as of April 1,

1947, was \$6,890.46. Receipts during the last year were: From Christmas Seal sales, \$6,000.04; from other sources, \$84.76.

Expenditures amounted to: Health education, \$1,143.76; case finding, \$1,815.98; T. B. patient expense, \$35; rehabilitation, \$5; cooperation with other agencies, \$145.44; social hygiene, \$169.15; Seal sale, \$1,139.27; organization and administration, \$1,388.49; miscellaneous, \$5. Total, \$5,686.09.

The total amount from Seal sale receipts was \$8,000, an increase of \$879.93 over 1947. Of the total, \$2,000 was turned over to the state association. Mrs. Ralph Church was chairman of

the Seal sale.

A detailed and comprehensive report of the association work is written in the report by Mrs. William F. Amiot, executive secretary. Included also is a message from Mrs. H. A. Watzig, president, expressing appreciation to the persons assisting with specific work and organizations who aided in the "program of health education and eradication of tuberculosis."

Among achievements of the association listed by Mrs. Amiot are: Programs were arranged and educational films supplied for P.T.A. and study club meetings. Posters were displayed and literature distributed to schools, clubs and various organizations.

A scholarship for summer school was donated by the association to a winner of the 4th Club health contest held annually in Douglas County. County meetings were held in Roseburg and field trips made by the officers and staff members to various towns throughout the county. The work of the association has been kept in the public eye through the medium of the radio and newspapers.

The executive secretary has attended "In Service Training" conferences in Portland. Two delegates, the president and executive secretary, were sent to the National Tuberculosis Association meeting in San Francisco and the annual joint meeting of the Oregon and Washington Tuberculosis Association in Portland. Contacts under the heading of health education, have been made with service, civic and social organizations.

The chest X-ray Survey Mobile Unit made two trips to Douglas County, taking a total of 2,046 X-rays. Gifts were sent to county patients in the State Tuberculosis

Hospital in Salem for Christmas, and other gifts extended. Two new adjustable hospital beds, completely equipped, were added to the association's loan closet. One was donated by the Elks Lodge No. 326, Douglas County added social hygiene to its program last year. The association has a small lending library, open to the public, and new equipment is being added to "better increase our efficiency in serving our community," the report states.

SIDELIGHTS ON DEWEY'S VISIT

Press correspondents with Governor Thomas E. Dewey's official party Friday practically took over the News-Review offices. It provided a convenient place for them to write their press releases. They weren't interested in listening to the Governor's campaign speeches. They had them in their pockets. All they had to do was add local color, write a lead and excerpts from the speech, then file them with a messenger from Western Union.

A famous person among the newspapermen was Bert Andrews, New York Herald-Tribune writer and Pulitzer prize winner. Andrews had a special dispatch to file and was only able to snatch a sandwich and cup of coffee. He had to forego the chicken dinner the other newspapermen enjoyed in the special luncheon room of the Umpqua Hotel. Andrews spent most of his two hours in Roseburg writing.

The correspondents stated they were getting a fine opportunity to see Oregon by bus. Out-of-staters, some of whom flew west with Governor Dewey, were impressed, but lacked favorable comment on the Coos Junction-Coos Bay highway. The bus driver, apparently making up time after a late start from Myrtle Point, was no respecter of curves, the passengers reported.

While Governor Dewey seemed to be standing up well under his heavy campaign schedule, some of his party admitted feeling the strain of long hours on the bus, short rest periods, quick lunches, and lack of laundry facilities. Some newspapermen claimed they weren't getting too much sleep, but indicated this may have been their own fault rather than that of the schedule. One correspondent jokingly boasted he had neither paid for nor slept in a hotel room the entire trip.

Republican Dewey was met, escorted and introduced by Roseburg's Democratic Mayor Albert G. Fliegel. Dewey laughingly predicted the mayor would be converted to a Republican by elec-

Governor Dewey expressed himself as very much impressed with the friendliness and hospitality of the city of Roseburg. His campaign managers and party members expressed a similar feeling.

Roseburg High School's Band, appearing in their class new uniforms, came in for acclaim, as they marched through the street and entertained before the Governor's arrival. The diminutive standard bearer, carrying the new banner presented by the band to the Kiwanis Club, had a bit of difficulty marching the straight and narrow while a strong breeze blew.

The weather man smiled long enough to permit the reception to be held outside on the Courthouse steps. A heavy shower shortly before made it seem imperative to hold the affair in the Armory, so townpeople shunted back and forth with alternate rays of sunshine or sprinkles of rain. The sun won out.

Stassen supporters, much in evidence during Dewey's outside appearance, were not able to question the speaker because of his tight schedule. Persons wearing Dewey and Stassen buttons alike circulated in the crowd.

Band Concert By Students Enjoyed By Big Audience

One of the largest crowds to attend a student performance at Roseburg High School was on hand Thursday night for the spring band concert presented by the senior, junior and beginner groups at the Senior High auditorium.

Under the direction of C. A. Ricketts, the band performed credibly and entertainingly. After four encore selections at the close of the performance, the senior band was forced to call it a night, as they had a heavy schedule Friday. They played during the Governor Dewey visit to Roseburg at noon and entertained at the Veterans Hospital in the afternoon.

The band was formally presented with two gifts. A banner, carrying the name "Roseburg Indians" was presented by the Kiwanis Club. It was purchased from funds derived from the gum ball machines, sponsored by the club for child welfare purposes. This they are to carry in the Rose Festival parade in Portland. The other gift was an American flag given personally by Bruce Elliott, manager of J. C. Penney Company.

Program numbers ranged from classical to South American tunes, marches and "boogie woogie." In addition to the band selections, Claren Blake played an accordion solo. A saxophone trio included Pat Andrus, Karen Kronk, Jerry Feldecamp; a cornet solo was played by Jim Ylvisaker; a trombone solo by Bill Anderson; a sousaphone solo by Gene Barnhart; and a cornet trio selection was offered by Dick Nickens, David Doerksen and Roland Shanklin.

Seniors who will be leaving the band upon graduation include Jerry McKown, Ernie Chambers, Claren Blake, Lorraine Losee, Gordon Doppler, Bill Mathews, Bill Anderson, Bob Hercher and Gene Barnhart.

Woehle was a busy man in Roseburg as he hurried from the courthouse where Governor Dewey addressed more than 3,000 persons to the News-Review office, where reporters wrote their press releases and to the Umpqua Hotel, where the Governor lunched with Republican leaders.

The assistant secretary ate his dinner, not in the hotel banquet room with the Governor, but in the smaller luncheon room, where a special dinner had been set for press men, photographers and other members of the Governor's party.

Hagerly, left in Portland with a streptococcus sore throat, was expected to join the official party this weekend.

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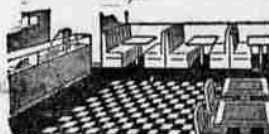
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
