MEETING THE VOTER

Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York, Republican candidate for president of the United States, made a most favorable impression when he visited Roseburg Friday.

Undoubtedly Governor Dewey gained many votes by the friendly way he met the people and by his clear-cut discussion of current issues. It was quite obvious that many voters climbed aboard his handwagon after being inspired by his warm personality.

Other voters, frankly impressed most favorably by the candidate from New York, expressed, however, a desire to see and hear Harold E. Stassen before making their final decision, but it was quite evident that the latter will have a certain amount of resistance to overcome.

With both Stassen and Dewey concentrating so heavily on Oregon, it is apparent that the Oregon vote will have a decided influence in either making or breaking one or the other. Sharing common views on the more important political matters, the candidates are forced to side issues for a political controversy.

Dewey has chosen to bring the question of basic civil rights into the campaign and is endeavoring to make of it the "peg" for his Oregon appearances. He challenges Stassen's earlier declaration that the Communist party should be outlawed by claiming that Communism and Communists must be kept out in the open, rather than being driven underground.

On the other hand, were it not for Dewey's known political stature, his magnification of the civil rights issue might easily be interpreted as a drowning man grasping for a straw, in view of the importance of the Oregon campaign and the lack of major differences between the two candidates concerning basic fundamentals of governmental procedure.

It is good that voters have an opportunity to meet and measure candidates personally. The American voter values his right of franchise, even though he often is careless in his use of it. He expects the office seeker to solicit his vote and to "sell" him on the candidate's particular merits.

General Hodges Warns
Early this week Lt. General John R. Hodges, U. S. military commander in South Korea, declared that a Communist government of all Korea undoubtedly would be the result of a "North Korean takeover of Soviet masters."

The two came back declaring that their trip "fulfilled the expectation of a large number of our fellow countrymen who are longing for the unification of our fatherland."

Dewey Too Soft On Commie Issue, Stassen Charges

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—Harold E. Stassen Saturday described the position of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey on combating Communism in this country as "too soft."

Stassen told a news conference that he himself favors outlawing the Communist party in the United States because "stopping infiltration of Communists may be one of the keys toward stopping World War III."

Ban on Sunday Liquor Sales in Portland Asked

PORTLAND, May 10.—(AP) proposal to ban the sale of beer and wine in Portland on Sunday will get a public hearing here May 11.

The city council scheduled the hearing after L. B. Sandblast, candidate for Multnomah County Sheriff, made the proposal. Sandblast said he understood the State Liquor Control Commission had authority to ban Sunday sales, and suggested the hearing to get the "wishes of the people of Portland."

Fugitive Czechs Tell of Iron Rule Of Communists

ERDING, Germany, May 10.—(AP)—Five Czechs said today they fled their homeland in an airplane, forcing the pilot at pistol point to land them in Germany.

As they told their story, Yiri Dnes, Czech consul in Munich, disclosed that a Czech training plane crash landed Wednesday on a highway near Ingolstadt. It was piloted by another man fleeing his country. In all, three Czech planes have landed in the U. S. zone of Germany with refugees since the Communist coup in February.

The airliner passengers said they fled Czechoslovakia Wednesday because they were being compelled to join the Communist party or lose their jobs. The leader was a former Czech air force pilot. He said he was ready to take over the controls if the pilot had refused to change his course.

Volunteer Home Service Revived By Red Cross Chapter

Because of the increasing number of requests for assistance being brought to the Douglas County Chapter of the American Red Cross, the chapter board decided to re-establish the volunteer Home Service Corps which was active here during the war years.

A small group of ladies was selected for training as social welfare aides to assist the professional social worker of the chapter. The first of a 10-session course was begun on Tuesday, May 4 and two sessions weekly will be held until the course is completed.

"System" Loses Battle To Beat Roulette Game

After another 24-hour spin at a local gaming emporium, Dr. Roy Walford, San Diego, and Albert Hibbs, Chillicothe, O., both 23, decided they had had enough. They said they lost another \$200. Battle Begins On Mormon Crickets

CORVALLIS, Ore. — (AP) — Northeastern Oregon's Mormon crickets are midway in their annual dance of the seven veils.

That could mean trouble in another month. Oregon State College Extension Service experts say a Mormon cricket sheds seven skins before it gets big enough to be called grown up. And Bob Every, extension entomologist, after a tour of Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow and Umatilla counties, says the crickets were half-grown.

Still in sagebrush country—to which they were largely confined last year in what threatened for a time to be a major outbreak—thousands of the crickets never will get to cast off that last skin. Every said 15 federal entomologists and control workers were covering 1,200 acres a week with poison bait and would step up that activity soon with bait-spraying equipment being hauled over the rough desert lands adjoining rich wheat fields.

Complete eradication is a big job, Every said, but enough poison baiting can save the crops. There are about as many crickets in the four-county area as there were last year, he said, but only 5 to 15 per cent are likely to live to shed off that seventh veil.
