He gave himself up voluntarily at his parents' request.

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Public Exhibit Planned By R. H. S. Art Students

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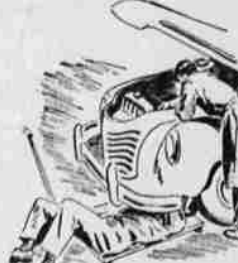
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
