The boy is Norbert Jazke, who wanted to buy his mother, Mrs. Joan Jazke, 48, a flower for Mother's Day. But he had no money, so he wrote a letter to a florist telling him of his plight. "Mom loves flowers so very much," he wrote. "She is always sick and she lost dad and is always sad now. My oldest brother has infantile so I can't ask him for money. I or we don't mind doing without things, but when it comes to our mom, we'd like to get her a flower. Dad always got her them when he lived. 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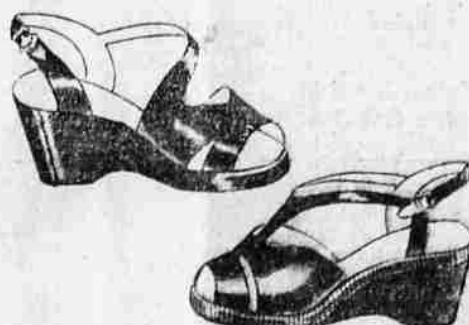
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
