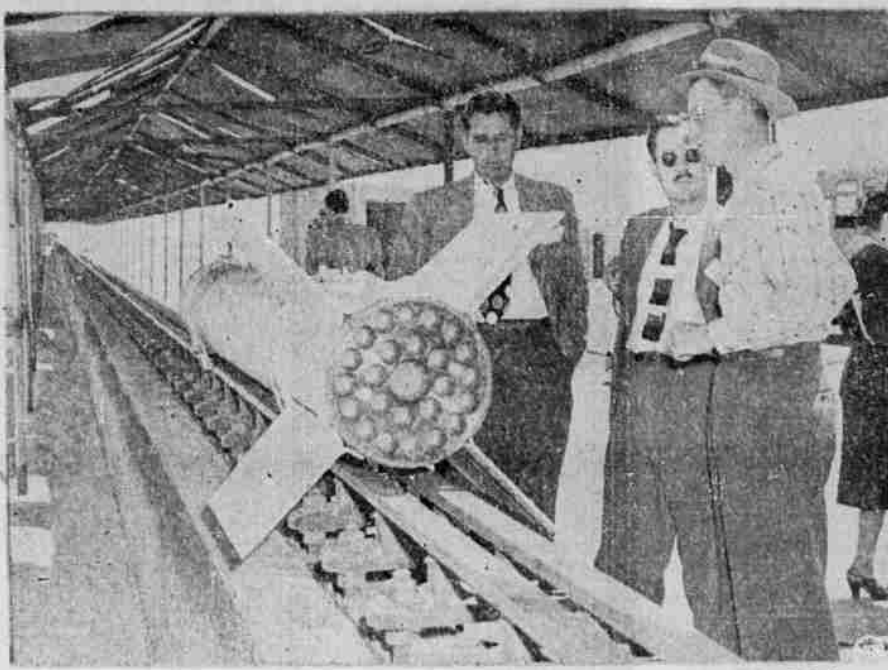

Lewis' Fate Heeded
Secretary of the Army Royal planned to confer again some time today with the heads of the three unions: David B. Robertson of the Locomotive Firemen & Enginemen; Alvanley Johnston of the Locomotive Engineers, and A. J. Glover of the Switchmen's Union.

A reporter asked Johnston yesterday: "If they enjoin you (get a court order) will you obey the law?"

Johnston laughed. He said: "Of course we will. What the hell are you asking a question like that for, after what happened to John Lewis?"

(Lewis and his United Mine Workers were fined \$142,000 for contempt of court because they were late in obeying a court's stop-strike order in the coal miners' pension dispute.)

Last night, after facing reporters and cameramen at frequent intervals all through a dramatic and swift-changing day, the three union chiefs cooped themselves up

in their hotel rooms and let a young assistant, Eddie Gloss, make the announcement to the country was waiting to hear.

At 10:20 p. m. when Gloss stepped out of an elevator into the lobby of the Hamilton Hotel and said simply to the waiting news-

men: "The brotherhoods will comply with the court order. Steps to that effect are being taken immediately."

The "steps" were telegrams the three union heads were rushing to their local offices.

CHICAGO, May 11.—(AP)—The threat of a rail strike sidetracked operations swung back to normal today over America's vast railroad network and in embargo-harried industries.

The canceled 6 a. m. deadline passed in all four time zones without a single reported break in railroad service. From railroad headquarters everywhere came the same report: "Operations normal."

Cancellation of the strike had or was expected to have these principal effects almost immediately:

1—Embargoes by 88 class one railroads banning shipment of perishable foods and livestock were lifted.

2—Thousands of laid off workers in the California-Florida fruit and vegetable industries and in shipping agencies will be recalled.

3—Prices of vegetables and fruits, which skyrocketed in the wholesale markets over the weekend, are expected to return to normal levels with resumption of shipments.

The Railway Express Agency lifted its embargo on livestock, poultry and perishable freight shipments and canceled furlough notices to its employees.

Pre-Registration For Camp Set For Camp Fire Girls

Pre-registration for a local summer camp for Camp Fire Girls will be held during the coming two weeks, according to the Roseburg Camp Fire Council. Purpose of this registration is to give those who are planning the construction of the camp an idea as to the number planning to attend. It is hoped that pre-registration may be conducted by May 21.

Location of a camp site will be announced in the near future. Guardians will be in charge of registration for their groups and are asked to collect \$3 as a pre-registration fee. Dates for camp are being tentatively set at July 18 and July 25 for Camp Fire Girls, and August 1 for Bluebirds, each session to be for one week. Pre-registration fee had previously been set at \$5 and guardians are asked to note the change to the lower figure.

Those in charge of the summer sessions have stated that summer camp cost will not exceed \$15 for each week. It is hoped that the cost per week can be lowered below this figure, depending on the number of girls who register. Parents are asked to note that rising cost of food must be considered by the council in placing the cost of a weekly camp session.

Sustained Forest Yield Decision To Come Next Month

WASHINGTON, May 11.—(AP)—The Interior Department will announce next month a decision on a proposed management program for public and private forest lands in western Oregon.

The decision will determine whether a Mohawk River unit will be established for sustained yield forest management. Such a unit, if established, would regulate cutting in accordance with growth to prevent forest depletion.

C. Girard Davidson, assistant secretary of the Interior, said he will go to Oregon early in June to make the announcement.

Davidson told a reporter he will address a public gathering, probably at Eugene. The time and place will be determined later.

The department will announce decision on these major considerations:

1. Whether to proceed with co-cuts to handle the backlog of embargoed cargoes.

operative agreements between the federal government and private owners to extend the sustained yield forestry management now in effect on 2,500,000 acres of interior-administered forest land in Western Oregon, to adjoining private lands.

2. Whether to establish the Mohawk River unit as the first cooperative-sustained yield forest unit under the program.

The proposed Mohawk unit would include 34,505 acres of federal forest land, 18,378 acres owned by the Fischer Lumber Co., Marcola, Ore., and 21,000 acres owned by others including the state, and Linn and Lane counties.

Einaudi Elected President of Italy

ROME, May 11.—(AP)—Vice-Premier Luigi Einaudi, 74-year-old banker-economist, was elected first president of the New Italian

republic tonight.

Even before the count on the fourth ballot was completed, Einaudi had the required majority of the 900 votes of both houses of parliament.

With about 200 votes still to be tallied, he had received 451.

Einaudi, 74, backed by the dominant Christian Democratic party, is a political independent. He is budget minister and governor of the Bank of Italy.

Foreign Minister Carlo Sforza, foe of the Communists, withdrew from the race last night after a day of bickering and two unsuccessful ballots.

Einaudi is an economist, politician, teacher and journalist. He taught finance at the University of Turin. He became governor of the Bank of Italy in 1944.
