Hitler's "Victory" Arch Now Monument to Jews

PORT ANGELES, Wash.—(AP)—On a visit to his former home in Southern Sweden two years ago, Charles Anderson, a Swedish mining man, saw the Hitler victory arch of red granite boxed and ready for shipment to Berlin. In a letter from a brother in Sweden this week, he learned the ultimate fate of what was to have been the carved victory arch. The letter contained a clipping from a Swedish newspaper, a picture of the carving and noted that on April 18 the monument had been unveiled at Warsaw, Poland, as a memorial to the 60,000 Jews killed by the Nazis there in 1943.

Anderson relates that Hitler paid 7 million kronen to Southern Sweden quarrymen and sculptors to quarry and carve the arch. It was boxed to be shipped when a German victory was assured. It was never delivered.

SUPER AGE BABIES

LONDON—(AP)—The way to meet the threat of the atomic age is to develop super-babies, the senior medical officer of the London County Council says.

Dr. Letitia Fairfield told the National Baby Welfare Council: "The very future of the universe depends upon our breeding a people so able to control their instincts and to regard the welfare of others as well as of themselves, that they can even overcome the menace of the atom bomb."

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Aged Man Held For Killing Benefactor

PENDLETON, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—A 70-year-old man was in the Morrow County jail in Heppner today charged with slaying his benefactor.

Morrow County Coroner A. D. McMurdo said Loren J. Ament would be held for the grand jury on manslaughter charges. The friend, William Greener, 54-year-old Heppner area rancher, died in a Pendleton hospital Monday night of gunshot wounds.

McMurdo said Ament apparently had shot Greener Friday night thinking he was a prowler. He said the aged man had been given a home by Greener after he was released from the Eastern Oregon state hospital.

The coroner said Greener had told Ament of valuable papers upstairs in the Greener home. The aged man apparently believed he was protecting those valuables when he fired the shot, McMurdo said.

Greener had gone to town that day and returned without Ament's knowledge, the coroner believed.

BOOST FOR DEWEY

PORTLAND, May 12.—(AP)—S. Eugene Allen, editor of the Oregon Labor Press, told a radio audience that the administrative record of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York was one of progress for labor progress.

He spoke as a member of the Republican party and a labor spokesman in endorsing the Dewey candidacy in the Oregon primary.

LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONSTRUCT SEWER LINE ON EAST SEVENTH STREET, AVENUE "A", EAST THIRD AVENUE NORTH AND AVENUE "B", CITY OF ROSEBURG, OREGON.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held May 5, 1948, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to construct a sewer on East Seventh

Street from the intersection of East Second Avenue North and East Seventh Street to the intersection of Avenue "B" and East Seventh Street near the northerly line of Avenue "B", with branches or laterals as follows:

Along Avenue "A" from East Seventh Street to a point approximately ten feet West of the intersection of East Sixth Street, along Avenue "B" from East Seventh Street to a point approximately ten feet West of the intersection of East Sixth Street, Oregon, in the following manner:

First: By excavating a trench to proper subgrade in which to install sewer pipe, and of sufficient width to permit proper installation and inspection.

Second: By tunneling under existing pavement, if necessary.

Third: By laying and installing approximately 1800 lineal feet of six-inch approximately 1200 lineal feet of eight-inch vitrified clay or concrete sewer pipe.

Fourth: By laying and installing approximately 30 vitrified clay sewer pipe Y's.

Fifth: By constructing seven concrete manholes with cast iron covers.

Six: By back-filling with earth or other suitable materials. Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on the 10th day of April, 1948, which said grade, plans and specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of the constructing of said sewer, including engineering, interest and all other expenses which the City of Roseburg would not have incurred except from the construction of said sewer shall be levied upon the property especially benefited thereby as provided by the charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and in accordance with the petition of property owners to be benefited by said sewer, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable detail cost of the construction and installation of said sewer is the sum of Eight Thousand Six Hundred Seven and 50/100 Dollars (\$8607.50) if concrete sewer pipe is used, or Eight Thousand Ninety Three and 75/100 Dollars (\$8933.75) if vitrified clay pipe is used.

BIG IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Recorder be, and she is hereby directed to give notice of the intention to construct and install said sewer as provided by the charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon.

Remonstrances against the construction and installation of said sewer may be filed in writing with the undersigned within twenty (20) days from the first publication of this notice, which first publication is the 31st day of May, 1948.

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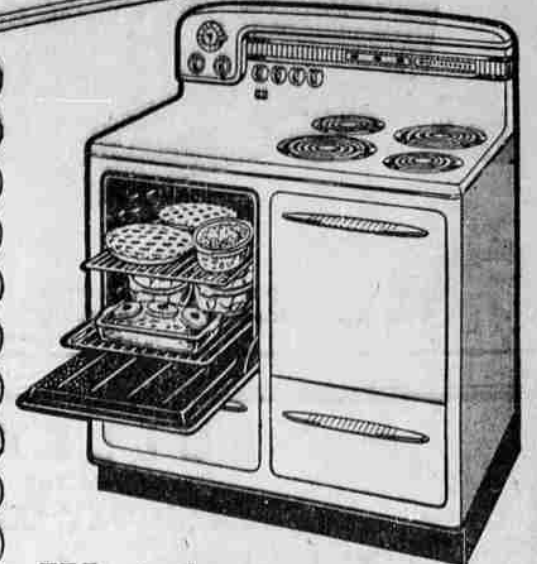
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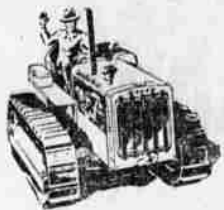
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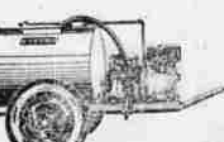
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
